Located in Grand Forks in the heart of the Red River Valley, the University of North Dakota is the largest and most diversified institution of higher learning in a three-state region. One of fewer than 70 public institutions with both a law school and a medical school, UND consistently ranks by most measures as one of the top 150 universities in the United States. Its nearly 15,000 students – including over 2,850 graduate students, 230 law students, and 275 medical students – come from every state in the union and more than 85 countries.

Stretching out from the banks of the scenic English Coulee, the 548-acre University of North Dakota campus has been nationally recognized for its landscaping and beauty. The 240 buildings demonstrate both classic university architecture blended with more futuristic facilities in the Aerospace complex.



UND's newest additions are the Gorecki Alumni Center, nationally recognized for its environmentally friendly sustainability features, the remodeled and expanded energy-efficient and environmentally conscious Education Building, the \$20 million Wellness Center, and University Place, an innovative apartment-style residence hall. Current construction projects include a new School of Medicine and Health Sciences approved by the North Dakota State Legislature, scheduled to be complete by summer 2016; a renovated and expanded School of Law, also approved by the State Legislature; the High Performance Athletics Center; and a renovated Wilkerson Hall, which will provide more dining options and gathering space for students.

With 243 fields of study and nearly 3,000 courses, including internationally recognized programs in aviation, aerospace, and unmanned aircraft systems, UND has a vast array of educational choices. The most popular programs include engineering, health professions, business, aerospace, and education. The University is characterized by a solid foundation of the liberal arts with professional programs, a manageable size, high-quality students and faculty, a varied curriculum, nine colleges and schools, a widely





Grand Forks, N.D., is a classic university town. Located in the heart of the Red River Valley on Interstate 29, the largely residential town offers a community environment with all the amenities of a large urban area and the safety and convenience of a small community, and is within driving distance of great amenities in the region.

Grand Forks has outdoor activities for every season:

- 900 acres of park land with trails, sports fields and courts, lakes, playground equipment.
- The Greenway - 2,200 acres along the Red River
- Twenty miles from Turtle River State Park.
- Five golf courses including King's Walk, the only PGA-rated golf course in North Dakota.
- One-of-a-kind Japanese Garden at Sertoma Park.

Greater Grand Forks is an impressively cosmopolitan city, boasting a regional population of roughly 75,000 residents and spanning two states. Because of its diversity, there's always live theatre, musical performances, art shows or a concert from rock to the Grand Forks Symphony somewhere in Grand Forks:

BETTY ENGELSTAD SIOUX CENTER


The Betty Engelstad Sioux Center (left and below) opened in August 2004 and is home to the UND volleyball and basketball teams, while also housing the Fighting Sioux women's soccer locker room and offices.

One of the premiere arenas of its kind in the country, the Sioux Center has a capacity of approximately 3,300. There are 2,600 seats with molded chair backs, 700 telescopic bleacher seats and additional seating in the VIP area.




APOLLO SPORTS COMPLEX


RAY RICHARDS GOLF COURSE

BRONSON FIELD

Bronson Field (above) has been the home of North Dakota women's soccer since the team's inception in 1999. The natural grass field is located on campus, west of the UND bookstore and part of the Ralph Engelstad Arena sports complex. A second practice field is located just east of the Ralph Engelstad Arena.



CHOICE HEALTH & FITNESS CLUB

The \$25 million Choice Health and Fitness Club opened its doors in August 2012 and serves as the home for UND tennis.

A 159,000 square foot facility, Choice Health and Fitness features six tennis courts among its many state-of-the-art amenities, as well as customized locker rooms for UND's men's and women's tennis teams.



KING'S WALK GOLF COURSE

King's Walk Golf Course (left) is the home to the University of North Dakota men's and women's golf teams. The Arnold Palmer-designed course recreates the atmosphere found on the great links courses of Scotland and Ireland.



RALPH ENGELSTAD ARENA

The most visited tourist destination in North Dakota, the new Ralph Engelstad Arena (above and right) has become widely regarded as the finest hockey facility in the world. The premiere home to college hockey, the Engelstad Arena has just about everything.

As soon as fans enter the doors, they know they are in the Fighting Sioux hockey arena. Seven NCAA and 14 WCHA championship banners hang proudly from the rafters.



UND ATHLETICS HIGH PERFORMANCE CENTER

Phase One of UND's state-of-the-art practice facility, which features a 100-meter football field and an 8-lane, 300-meter track, was completed in August 2015. Once fully completed, the facility will also include spectator seating, an academic center, a sports medicine facility, and strength and conditioning amenities. Among the finest of its kind in North America, the facility will be utilized by all of UND's athletics programs in addition to hosting area competitions.

KRAFT FIELD

The North Dakota baseball team plays its home games at Kraft Field, a facility owned and operated by the Grand Forks Park District that includes bleacher seating for 2,000 in a picturesque setting with evergreens lining the outfield fences. The facility recently received a new artificial infield prior to the 2011 season.





UND's Academic Awards Night in February honored 336 student-athletes who achieved a 3.0 GPA during the Fall 2014 semester, representing 74 percent of UND's student-athlete population. Seventy of those student-athletes owned a perfect 4.0 GPA.



The George and Arlene Schubert Athletics Academic Center provides a comfortable and centrally-located site to aid in the promotion of academics for all student-athletes.



NOTABLE ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2014-15

- UND's student-athletes owned a collective 3.23 GPA in 2014-15, the highest single-year GPA in UND Athletics history.
- Eighteen of UND's 21 teams boasted a GPA of 3.0 or higher.
- UND placed a school-record 213 student-athletes on academic all-conference teams.
- Seventy-two percent of UND's student-athletes boasted a 3.0 GPA during the Spring 2015 semester.
- Hockey players Shelby Amsley-Benzie and Nick Mattson earned Academic All-America honors.
- Mattson earned his second straight NCAA Elite 89 Award for men's hockey at the NCAA Frozen Four.
- Men's and women's track & field, men's & women's cross country, and men's & women's swimming & diving each earned academic team honors from their respective national organizations.
- UND had a Big Sky-leading five teams earn NCAA Public Recognition Awards: men's cross country, men's tennis, men's indoor track, men's outdoor track, and women's basketball.

UND Athletics prides itself on the academic excellence of its student-athletes, whose athletic achievements are matched by academic distinction on a yearly basis.

The George and Arlene Schubert Athletics Academic Center, which opened in April 2008, serves as a study center for student-athletes and is conveniently located in the Hyslop Sports Center.

Academic services director Amanda Hajdu oversees the study center, which features 12 state-of-the-art, desktop computers and provides an excellent location for student-athletes to utilize between classes for valuable daytime study. The academic center is also available on demand to student-athletes for evening study table.

UND's student-athletes also have access to a variety of laptop computers for use on road trips, further emphasizing a department-wide commitment to academics.



ALL-TIME ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

A longtime hallmark of North Dakota Athletics has been academic excellence.

Since making the transition to Division I competition in 2008-09, UND's student-athletes have earned 22 Academic All-America honors, seven NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships, and five prestigious NCAA academic awards.

UND established its academic reputation with 64 Academic All-Americans at the Division II level, fourth-most all-time among DII schools.





MISSION

It is our mission to physically and mentally prepare the student-athlete for the rigors of collegiate athletics, by implementing professionally designed, scientifically sound training programs, designed specifically to reduce the incidence of injury and help each team and student-athlete reach their full athletic potential.

PHILOSOPHY

We believe that strength and conditioning is crucial to the complete development of the student-athlete. The philosophy of our strength and conditioning program is based on the belief that what occurs in the weight room and field transfers to the

playing surface. We train sport specifically with the goal of enhancing athleticism. We also believe in the importance of work ethic, attitude, accountability and mental toughness and that these qualities can be developed and enhanced through our strength and conditioning program.

At the University of North Dakota, one program, functioning behind the scenes, but which should not be taken lightly, is the strength and conditioning program. The strength and conditioning program at UND is among the finest in Division I and vital to the success of all UND athletic teams. The strength and conditioning staff commits themselves to the development of size, strength, power, speed, agility, conditioning, and body composition of each student-athlete. The goal of the strength staff is to develop the athlete and team to reach their maximum potential throughout their career while staying injury free.

Nate Baukol, director of strength and conditioning, oversees the program and facilities. Baukol has three full-time assistant coaches and one graduate assistant coach to assist him.

Together they direct and monitor the training of over 400 student-athletes on 21 teams at UND. UND also boasts some of the finest strength training facilities around. The facilities include weight rooms at the Ralph Engelstad Arena, the Betty Engelstad Sioux Center, Memorial Stadium, and the Hyslop Sports Center.

Training has become a year-round activity, with a student athlete spending as much time on physical development as any other part of their sport throughout the year. Student-athletes follow either off-season or in-season programs, which are individualized specific to the athlete and sport. Off-season programs are five days a week, summer months included.

Each athlete receives a comprehensive summer training manual to follow, given that a member of the strength staff won't be supervising them. In-season programs are typically 45-minute sessions, two to three days per week, supervised by the strength and conditioning staff.





Steve Westereng

One of the unfortunate aspects of athletics is that injuries do occur. However, every student-athlete from UND athletic teams are under excellent care thanks to the UND Division of Sports Medicine and its umbrella of staff, facilities and training.

With a staff of 11 faculty athletic trainers, three graduate assistant athletic trainers and 30 athletic training students headed by director of sports medicine Steve Westereng, UND student-athletes are in good hands, returning them quickly and safely to participation.

The UND Division of Sports Medicine was formed in 1990. Additionally, the bachelor of science in athletic training degree and the UND Center for Sports Medicine was founded. The athletic training education program was the first program in the nation to be placed directly in a school of medicine and is housed within the Department of Family Medicine, combining the efforts of the UND Athletic Training program and the UND School of Medicine and Health Sciences.

UND's progressive thinking makes the institution a leader in the field of athletic training. Moreover, the program's affiliation with the School of Medicine helps both the athletic training student and the student-athlete. Completion of the bachelor of science in athletic training allows the student to sit for the board of certification exam to become a certified athletic trainer (ATC).

The student-athletes also benefit from having a wealth of competent individuals getting them back into action.

In order to be accepted into the athletic training program, a student must complete 100 hours of observation, fill out a formal application, and have a minimum GPA of 2.75.

The Division of Sports Medicine also has an outpatient facility, the UND Center for Sports Medicine, which specializes in rehabilitation of orthopedic injuries. UND student-athletes, as well as the general public, utilize this facility to decrease pain, increase strength, and improve range of motion of injuries. Many of the injuries seen in the Center for Sports Medicine are significant, such as pre- and post-surgical issues. The center is staffed by Cathy Ziegler, PT/ATC, and Robin Tracy, PT/ATC, who have experience with high school, college, and professional athletes.

The University of North Dakota boasts a proud history of varsity athletics nicknames. UND's first official athletics nickname was the "Flickertails," although its origin remains somewhat a mystery. The nickname made its first public appearance in a *Grand Forks Herald* account of UND's football loss to Minnesota on Oct. 8, 1904, 15 years after UND's first athletics contest was played. According to Lee Bohnet's *A Century of UND Sports*, "The author was not identified, but there is strong evidence the nickname was coined by a Minneapolis sportswriter who may have covered the game for the Herald. The writer lauded the fighting spirit of the North Dakota players."

In 1911, UND's student body officially adopted "Flickertails" as its athletics nickname. UND would remain known as the "Flickertails" (as well, unofficially, as the "Nodaks") for a third of a century, establishing an early athletics history.

In the fall of 1930, the university adopted the nickname "Sioux" for its varsity teams following a successful renaming campaign by the *Dakota Student*, UND's student newspaper. The word "Fighting" was later added, and UND would be known as the "Fighting Sioux" until the summer of 2012.

The university utilized several "Fighting Sioux" logos throughout the decades, perhaps most notably the green geometric logo introduced in 1976 and the most recent full-color logo was unveiled in 1999. The former was designed by an artist at the UND News Bureau, while the latter was created by noted Native American artist and UND alum Bennett Brien.

The University of North Dakota officially retired its longtime "Fighting Sioux" nickname and logo prior to the 2012-13 athletics season.

UND's varsity athletics teams will operate without an official nickname until 2015. The university's varsity athletics teams will be referred to as "the University of North Dakota," "North Dakota," or "UND."



Following the University's first athletic competition in 1889, UND's earliest teams were known unofficially as the "Nodaks" (pictured above is the 1896 football team). The "Flickertails" nickname made its first appearance in a 1904 *Grand Forks Herald* article and was officially adopted in 1911.



The University of North Dakota adopted the interlocking ND as its official logo during the summer of 2012 following the retirement of the Fighting Sioux nickname and logo. The interlocking ND will be utilized until 2015, when a new athletics nickname



UND's most recent Fighting Sioux logo, designed by noted Native American artist and UND alum Bennett Brien, was unveiled in 1999. The logo was named the No. 1 hockey logo in the world by *The Hockey News* in 2009.



The geometric Fighting Sioux logo was introduced in 1976 and remained in use through the 1999-2000 season.



The current University of North Dakota logo has been in use since the close of Centennial year activities in 1984. It serves as the official logo of the University, but typically is not used for athletics purposes.





PRESIDENT

Dr. Robert Kelley



The 11th president of the University of North Dakota, Dr. Robert Kelley spearheaded UND's development of "Exceptional UND," a vision roadmap that outlines five strategic priorities: Enrich the Student Experience; Encourage Gathering; Facilitate Collaboration; Expand UND's Presence; Enhance Quality of Life. Under his leadership, UND has made great strides in all of these areas since "Exceptional UND" was adopted in 2010.


A leader with a national reputation, Kelley began serving as UND's president on July 1, 2008. Prior to that, he served as the dean of the College of Health

Sciences and professor of medical education and public health at the University of Wyoming since 1999. Before then, he was associate vice chancellor for research and executive associate dean of the graduate college at the University of Illinois at Chicago, and professor of biological sciences at the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and professor of anatomy and cell biology at the College of Medicine, both at the University of Illinois at Chicago. At the University of New Mexico, he served as chair of anatomy and senior executive associate dean for the School of Medicine. He also taught at the University of California, Berkeley.

Kelley's international appointments include service as a Distinguished Visiting Professor of Biomedicine at the University of the Sunshine Coast in Queensland, Australia (2006); a Visiting Professor at St. George's School of Medicine in St. George, Grenada (a two-week annual appointment from 1996 to the present); a Consultant to the Prime Minister of Nepal through the U.S. State Department for the purpose of development of a medical school with a Western curriculum in Kathmandu, Nepal (1991); a Visiting Professor at the Ludwig Institute for Cancer Research at the University of Sao Paulo in Sao Paulo, Brazil (1990); a Visiting Research Professor in the Department of Developmental Biology at the National Institute for Basic Biology, Okazaki National Research Institutes in Okazaki, Japan (1984-85); an International Exchange Scholar for the National Science Foundation International Division at the University of Poona in India (1982); and a Visiting Research Fellow at The Hubrecht Laboratory for Developmental Biology in Utrecht, The Netherlands (1972-73).

Kelley has served as chair of the Assembly for the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC), chaired the Council of Academic Societies for the AAMC, and was a member of the executive board of the National Board of Medical Examiners, which is responsible for the U.S. medical licensure examination. In addition, he has served the National Institutes of Health (NIH) on several study sections, served on the director's advisory board for NIH strategic planning, and chaired the Minority Biomedical Research Support Program advisory committee in the NIH Division of Research Resources. That program helped support research for historically black universities, tribal colleges, and "minority-majority" institutions. He also served as principal investigator for the University of Wyoming/Northern Rockies INBRE (IDeA Network of Biomedical Research Excellence), a National Institutes of Health program that promotes biomedical research and connects the state's community colleges with the University of Wyoming.

Kelley earned his bachelor's degree in biology and chemistry from Abilene (Texas) Christian University in 1965, and his master's degree in 1966 and doctorate in 1969, both in cell and developmental biology, from the University of California, Berkeley.



Sue Jenó, Faculty Athletics Representative

Sue Jenó, an associate professor in UND's Department of Physical Therapy, serves as the Faculty Athletics Representative (FAR) to the National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA), a position she has held the position since November 2006.

Jenó has served as a member of UND's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee (IAC) since 2001, as well as numerous other university committees, and was the chair of the University Senate during the 2005-06 academic year. She is also active in her professional organization, having served as treasurer of the North Dakota Physical Therapy Association for the nine years.

Jenó is a former NCAA Division I student-athlete and coach. After competing for the University of Michigan varsity synchronized swimming team, she graduated and served as an assistant coach for the Wolverines for two seasons.

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Brian Faison

Brian Faison is in his eighth year as athletics director at the University of North Dakota. Faison assumed his duties at UND in May of 2008.

During his tenure UND has successfully completed the five-year reclassification process to Division I. Alumni and fan support have continued to grow: Champions Club and endowment giving have enjoyed nine straight record years; \$18.8 million in private funding has been secured for the first phase of the UND Athletics High Performance Center; and last year women's ice hockey finished third and men's hockey finished first nationally in total home attendance.

Media coverage has continued to grow with multi-year, multi-sport broadcast agreements with Midco Sports Network and Fox College Sports for television, Clear Channel for radio with continuing expansion of all social media platforms.

In the classroom, student-athletes have continued to excel: this past year a record number of student-athletes were named to the Athletic Director's Honor Roll for the Fall and Spring semesters resulting in the highest GPA for the year in the history of the program; more than 200 earned academic all-conference honors; three received CoSIDA All-District honors; two student-athletes were named CoSIDA Academic All-Americans; and, volleyball, softball, men's tennis, women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's track and field all were recognized nationally for their academic performance.

Competition for UND last year resulted in two teams advancing to post-season play -- women's basketball to the Women's Basketball Invitational (WBI), and men's ice hockey to its 13th straight NCAA tournament and its 20th Frozen Four appearance.

Faison has helped secure membership in the Big Sky Conference (BSC) for 14 UND teams and landed men's and women's swimming & diving and baseball in the Western Athletic Conference (WAC). He also played a leadership role in the formation of the National Collegiate Hockey Conference (NCHC) partnering with Colorado College, Denver, Miami, Minnesota Duluth, St. Cloud State, Western Michigan and Nebraska Omaha.

With over 30 years of experience in intercollegiate athletics, Faison has served on several conference, regional and national sports committees. Most recently he chaired the NCHC Board of Directors for two years and chaired the BSC Joint Council. Faison currently serves on the BSC Administration Committee, and chairs the NCAA Division I Men's Hockey Committee.

Prior to joining UND Faison served as special assistant to the president (2004-08) and director of athletics (1999-04) at New Mexico State University. Before that, he was national director of development for the National Children's Cancer Society (1995-99). Faison also served as director of athletics at Indiana State University (1988-95), assistant athletics director for development at the University of Louisville (1984-88) and assistant athletics director for promotions and fund raising at Illinois State University (1979-84). He also had stints as assistant manager for athletics public relations (1978-79) and assistant director for alumni activities (1974-78) at the University of Missouri.

Faison is a 1972 graduate of the University of Missouri. He and his wife Donna have three sons: Jonathan, Matthew and Bradley, and a grandson Harrison.

Alerus CENTER

North Dakota plays its football home games at the Alerus Center - a 12,283-seat stadium located just minutes from the UND campus in Grand Forks.

The Alerus Center features a new AstroTurf playing surface that was installed for the 2012 season that allows for rapid field conversion. Locker rooms are adorned in UND colors and are dividable into four 25-locker sections. There are also dressing rooms for coaches and officials. State-of-the art scoreboards, 15-by-30 Daktronics video replay boards and a BOSE sound system make the stadium one of the most exciting places in the nation to watch Football Championship Subdivision football.

The Alerus has 18 luxury VIP suites, eight concession stands, two vending stands, 14 ticket windows in three locations and four merchandise stands. There are 4,075 parking spaces available.

HOME-FIELD ADVANTAGE

More than half-a-million fans have seen UND post a 72-20 record at the Alerus Center in its 11 seasons of existence. That mark includes a 10-0 postseason record and a school record 23-game home winning streak from 2002 to 2005.

In 2004, UND led the nation in Division II total attendance for the second straight year, with 75,110 fans passing through the gates to watch Fighting Sioux football - an average of 9,389 per game.

In 2008, which was the team's first at the FCS level, fans broke yet another attendance record as UND averaged 10,617 fans for its five home games.

UND fans have been enthusiastic ever since the Alerus Center opened, but one of the most vocal crowds came in that first year as the venue hosted a 2001 NCAA semifinal game against UC Davis. In that game, UC Davis was flagged seven times for illegal procedure among its 12 penalties on the day. After the game, UC Davis players cited the noise level of the Alerus Center crowd as one of the reasons for the penalties.

During the 2001 season, more than 100,000 fans turned out to watch their home team play at the Alerus, and UND's regular season average attendance of 10,517 was a school record. The previous school record was 9,150 in 1976, when the UND drew an estimated 36,600 for four games at Memorial Stadium.

UND's average attendance was also the third-best figure nationally in NCAA Division II for 2001. UND finished fourth nationally in Division II attendance in 2000, its final season at Memorial Stadium.



ELITE CAMP

This semi-contact camp for players entering grades 9-12 features personalized instruction from UND coaches and focuses on each player's skill improvement. Each position conducts an individual position camp with an emphasis on all skills and fundamentals. The value of conditioning and proper weight lifting techniques are also stressed.

Campers have the option of being a commuter or a resident camper with full room and board and each will receive a camp t-shirt, certificate the chance to win other prizes.

7-ON-7 PASSING CAMP

For 20-plus years the UND football program has conducted this popular team passing tournament, the first of its kind in the region. Head coach Bubba Schweigert enters his second season at the helm of the UND football program in 2015 and will look to carry the momentum of closing 2014 with back-to-back wins into year two.

Schweigert's first UND squad won five games overall, which was a two-game improvement from the previous season, and the year was highlighted by a 30-28 upset of No. 22 Northern Arizona in the final home game of the season at the Alerus Center.

UND took the positive vibes from a victory that knocked NAU out of the FSC playoff hunt to Greeley, Colo., the next Saturday where the team closed out the season with its first Big Sky road win of the season -- a 33-14 defeat of Northern Colorado.

The defensive-minded head coach still works with the team's cornerbacks and they were part of a unit that led the Big Sky in total defense and rush defense in 2014. Two newcomers earned All-Big Sky Conference honors (KR Alex Tillman and PK Reid Taubenheim) and seven more players were named honorable mention in Schweigert's first season.

There were also 16 UND football players named to the All-Big Sky Academic team, which tied a program record for individuals honored in one season.

The Zeeland, N.D., native returned to Grand Forks after 10 years away from a program that he helped lead to the 2001 NCAA Division II national title as defensive coordinator.

Prior to his return to UND, Schweigert was the defensive coordinator at Southern Illinois for the previous six seasons (2008-13) and served as associate head coach for the last five of that stretch. His 2010 defense led the Missouri Valley in total defense and his unit finished in the top half of the league in four of his six campaigns at SIU.

In his six seasons at SIU, Schweigert coached three first team All-Americans and 20 all-conference selections (10 first team, six second team, four honorable mentions). His defensive standouts have included linebacker and 2012 graduate Jayson DiManche, currently playing for Cincinnati Bengals, and cornerback Corey Lindsey, a three-time All-American and a 2011 draft pick of the Bengals. In 2013, SIU linebacker Bryan Presume earned first team All-MVFC honors after ranking third in the league with 104 tackles. His 55 solo stops were tops in the conference.

"It is truly an honor and a privilege to serve the University of North Dakota as its head football coach," said Schweigert at the time of his hiring. "I am looking forward to hiring a staff and building a program that will represent UND in a first-class manner, both on and off the field. We will put forth great effort to facilitate positive relations with fans, alumni, the community and the student body. We look forward to playing exciting championship football in front of thousands of loyal fans as we strive to win the Big Sky Conference championship and, ultimately, reach the pinnacle of FCS football."

Prior to arriving at SIU, Schweigert took on his first head coaching job at the collegiate level, leading the Division II program at Minnesota Duluth from 2004-07. He guided the Bulldogs to a 22-21 overall record during his tenure, including the program's first North Central Conference title in 2005. The NCAA playoff berth that season was the program's second in four seasons. That same season, Schweigert was also named the D2football.com Northwest Region Coach of the Year and the AFCA Division II Coach of the Year for Region 5.

This will be the second stint at UND for Schweigert. He spent 15 seasons as an assistant coach in Grand Forks (1989-2003) where he was part of eight NCAA playoff teams and six NCC title squads.

Schweigert was elevated to defensive coordinator at UND prior to the 1997 season and left for Duluth after the 2003 UND team finished as national runner-up. Schweigert was named the American Football Coaches Association Division II Assistant Coach of the Year in 2000.

In his seven seasons as UND's defensive coordinator, Schweigert's defensive players earned 14 All-America honors and 23 first-team All-NCC accolades. His 2001 defense yielded just 191.4 yards of offense and 50.3 rushing yards per game, while limiting opponents to 12.5 points per game on the way to the program's first national championship.

Schweigert began his coaching career at his alma mater, now the University of Jamestown, from 1985-1988. He earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Jamestown and a master's degree from UND. In 2002, he was honored with Jamestown's Rollie Greeno Award for outstanding commitment in the field of education and coaching.

Schweigert and his wife, Laura, have two sons, Alex and Cooper.

PAUL RUDOLPH
OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QUARTERBACKS

Paul Rudolph will begin his second season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at UND in 2015. The first official hire made by second-year head coach Bubba Schweigert, Rudolph saw his 2014 offense find its footing late in the season and expects that momentum to carry over into year two.

Senior running back Jer Garman would earn All-Big Sky honorable mention honors after racking up 858 yards rushing and seven touchdowns. Garman was the catalyst behind the offense's late-season success, racking up 730 yards and six touchdowns in the final five contests.

Fullback Dwayne Pecosky and tight end Zach Adler would also earn All-Big Sky honorable mention honors on the offensive side of the ball in 2014.

Rudolph brought 23 years of collegiate coaching experience to the program when he arrived in January of 2014, including 16 as a head coach. He won two conference titles and made two playoff appearances during stops as a head coach at Upper Iowa (1992-2000) and Minot State (2007-2013) and was a successful offensive coordinator at St. Cloud State in between those two stints.

Rudolph's last seven years as a head coach were spent in Minot where he helped lead the Beavers through a transition from the NAIA level to NCAA Division II status. He led MSU to a pair of DAC titles during his tenure in the Magic City and was named the DAC Coach of the Year in his first season in 2007. The Beavers earned a playoff berth in 2009, which was the school's first appearance since 2001.

A Stanley, N.D., native, the coaching veteran earned Schweigert's respect when the two squared off against each other during their respective NCC tenures. Rudolph was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at St. Cloud State from 2000-2006 when Schweigert was the defensive coordinator at UND and head coach at Minnesota-Duluth.

While with the Huskies, Rudolph's offense broke 26 single-season school records and 21 more single-game records. He helped lead SCSU to the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2004 and a 2002 North Central Conference title.

Before moving onto SCSU, Rudolph spent 10 seasons at Upper Iowa, including the last eight as the Peacocks head coach. He was named the Iowa Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in 1992 when his team's offense ranked second nationally with 456.8 yards per game. Rudolph also served as the athletics director at Upper Iowa from 1996-2000.

Rudolph and his wife, Renae, have three children, Zachary, McKenzie and Creighton. Zachary, a former wide receiver, played underneath his father for four seasons at Minot State.





ERIC SCHMIDT

Former UND linebacker Eric Schmidt will embark on his second season as his alma mater's defensive coordinator in 2015. His unit made quite the impression in the Big Sky during his first season as UND led the league in both total defense and rushing defense and was third in scoring defense.

Schmidt, who also coaches the middle linebackers, saw junior Will Ratelle earn All-Big Sky honorable mention honors and become the first UND player to eclipse the century mark in tackles since Digger Anderson (2004), finishing with 106. Ratelle was one of three UND defenders to garner all-conference honors in 2014.

His unit was also among the best in the FCS in tackles for loss, racking up the sixth-highest total in the country with 111. That total topped the Big Sky and the defense's 34 sacks were second most in the league.

Schmidt is no stranger to head coach Bubba Schweigert as he spent the previous six seasons as a pupil of UND's second-year head coach during his time at Southern Illinois and excelling for him as a player at UND from 1997-2001.

"Eric Schmidt is one of the top, young defensive minds in the game, especially when it comes to a 3-4 defense. He had a lot of responsibility down at Southern Illinois for us and I have a lot of confidence in him," Schweigert said.

"And that is not only as a defensive coordinator, but as a leader overall.

"We sat in his living room as a high school senior and he told us he was coming to UND so we can win a national championship. That was his focus and I just believe as a player, he never lost that focus and he was going to do everything within his power to lead our team and keep us on that path. He has the same type of passion as a coach and the last six years I have leaned on him a lot as we coached and implemented our defensive philosophy at SIU."

As Schweigert mentioned, the Mandan, N.D., native was key a performer as a team captain and senior linebacker on the defense that helped lead UND to a Division II national title in 2001 and has been equally important as a staff member for his SIU defense that has ranked near the

top of the Missouri Valley Conference in a number of categories during their tenure in Carbondale.

"UND is a special place and I am really excited to get back there," Schmidt said. "I really appreciate the opportunity Coach Schweigert has given me. I am anxious to get started and make a difference. I think that is really what sold me on coming back. I am eager to get things started and move forward."

In six seasons on Dale Lennon's staff at SIU (2007-13), Schmidt coached the defensive line and both sets of linebackers before being elevated to special teams coordinator for the past two seasons. He was also in charge of the inside linebackers during his final two seasons and helped a 2012 defensive unit record a pair of shutouts and rank 10th nationally in rushing yards allowed. He coached nine All-Missouri Valley Conference players during his time at SIU, including one first-teamer in 2013.

Schmidt's first collegiate coaching job came as an assistant coach at his alma mater from 2006-07 for Lennon before both moved onto SIU. Schmidt began his football coaching career at nearby Crookston High School where he was the head coach for the Pirates from 2002-2005.

Schmidt played for UND from 1998 to 2001 and was a two-time All-North Central Conference selection and earned All-America honors as a senior in 2001.

Schmidt received his bachelor's degree in secondary education from UND in 2002. He and his wife, Tiffany, have a daughter, Kennedy, and a son, Truman.

Shawn Kostich is set to begin his second season with the North Dakota football program as the special teams coordinator and tight ends and fullbacks coach.

In his first season at UND, Kostich coached three of his players to All-Big Sky honors, including true freshman placekicker Reid Taubenheim, who earned third-team honors after leading all FCS rookies with 16 made field goals in 2014.

Taubenheim connected on 11 of his 12 attempts and hit a game-winner from 35 yards out with four seconds remaining to upset No. 22 Northern Arizona late in the season. Tight end Zach Adler also had the best season of his career en route to honorable mention All-Big Sky honors. He finished second on the team with 24 receptions and led the team with 265 receiving yards.

Adler and fullback Dwayne Pecosky, who also collected honorable mention honors, were key blockers for a run game that found its footing late in the season, averaging 170.0 ypg in the final five contests.

Kostich arrived in Grand Forks after a five-year stint that spanned two coaching stints at Minnesota. In his first role as an offensive intern on head coach Tim Brewster's staff, Kostich worked with the tight ends and broke down opponent's defensive film from 2009-10.

When Jerry Kill took over as head coach, Kostich rejoined the staff as a defensive graduate assistant and worked primarily with the safeties for the past three seasons (2011-13). He was also the lead coach for the kickoff unit and coached individual positions on punt units, punt return units and kickoff return units.

His first coaching job after graduating with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Minnesota was at Breck High School where he worked with the wide receivers and defensive backs. Kostich also holds a master's degree from Minnesota in applied kinesiology.

Luke Knauf is set to begin his second season as the offensive line coach at UND in 2015. Knauf used a consistent line-up in 2014 that saw the same five players start 10 of the 12 contests and account for 58 of the 60 starts along the front.

That unit provided a spark late in the season when the offense started to increase its production. In the last five games, the ground game averaged 170.0 ypg, which was nearly 100 yards better than its first seven.

Knauf (pronounced Kuh-noff) arrived in Grand Forks after a nearly three-year stint at Western New Mexico. He was the offensive line coach during his first two seasons at the Division II school before being elevated to offensive coordinator in November of 2012.

Prior to his stint in New Mexico, Knauf was the offensive line and tight ends coach and assistant offensive coordinator at Luther College in Decotah, Iowa. His first collegiate coaching post was as an assistant offensive line coach at Wisconsin-La Crosse.

The Stratford, Wisc., native, Knauf played four seasons at Wisconsin as a guard and center for the Badgers. He obtained a bachelor's degree in zoology from UW in 2006 and completed a master's degree in sports management from the United States Sports Academy in 2010.

Gigli (pronounced Gee-lee) remained in the Big Sky with his latest move, having spent the previous three seasons upon his arrival in Grand Forks working in a similar position at Sacramento State.

Senior Baylee Carr was third on the team in tackles with 68 and redshirt freshman finished fifth with 59 despite missing two games.

Kevin Maurice is set to being his second season as UND's running backs coach and recruiting coordinator in 2015. For Maurice, his first season in Grand Forks saw his hard work pay off in the end as senior Jer Garman emerged as an all-conference selection under Maurice's watch.

After losing two key contributors in the back field to season-ending injuries during the campaign, Garman took control of the ground attack in the final five games, averaging 146.0 ypg. That stretch included a 235-yard, two-touchdown effort in the upset of No. 22 Northern Arizona and helped him notch honorable mention All-Big Sky honors.

Maurice spent the 2012 and 2013 seasons at Purdue where he began his tenure as a graduate assistant before being named director of player personnel. In February of 2013, he was elevated to assistant recruiting coordinator at the Big Ten school for head coach Danny Hope.

Prior to his two years in West Lafayette, Ind., Maurice made stops at three other FBS programs with the latest coming as an offensive graduate assistant at Nevada in 2011. He briefly served as a recruiting assistant at Miami (Fla.) before joining the Wolfpack staff. Maurice spent the 2010 season as a recruiting assistant for head coach Butch Jones at Cincinnati.

Before making the move to the FBS level, Maurice spent a season as the running backs coach at Midwestern State (Texas) in 2009 and was an offensive coordinator at North Miami (Fla.) High School in 2008. The Miami native played collegiately at UTEP for two seasons in 2003 and 2004 and finished his bachelor's degree in criminal justice at St. Joseph's (Ind.) College in 2005.

**DANNY FREUND**
WIDE RECEIVERS**Year at UND:** 5th year

Former North Dakota quarterback Danny Freund is back for his fifth season on his alma mater's coaching staff and will coach the wide receivers for the second-straight season. Freund previously coached the UND running backs (2011-12) and quarterbacks (2013).

In his first season working with the wide receivers, Freund turned former defensive back Josh Seibel into the team's leading receiver. Seibel went catchless through the first six games of the season but finished the campaign with a team-high 25 receptions. Seibel filled in admirably for senior R.J. McGill, who was lost for the season after catching 23 passes through seven games.

As the quarterbacks coach in 2013, Freund's year was highlighted by the efforts of redshirt freshman Ryan Bartels, who broke UND freshman records for single-game completions (39), passing yards (367) and passing touchdowns (4) at Northern Arizona.

In 2012 as the running backs coach, senior Mitch Sutton was one of the top touchdown producers at running back in the Big Sky. His 11 touchdowns ranked fourth among league running backs. Sutton (467) shared the work load with sophomore Jake Miller (543) and the two combined to rush for more than 1,000 yards.

In 2011, sophomore Jake Miller earned All-Great West Conference first team honors and became the first player in league history to earn three consecutive GWC Offensive Player of the Week accolades. Miller finished the campaign with 942 rushing yards and 13 rushing touchdowns, which both ranked second among GWC backs.

Freund's rushers averaged nearly 150 yards per game on the ground, accounting for more than 1,500 yards. Miller and junior Mitch Sutton combined for five 100-yard rushing efforts and the ground attack churned out a season-high six rushing scores vs. Black Hills State.

Miller burst onto the scene at FBS foe Fresno State when he rushed for 145 yards and three scores, including a 70-yard touchdown run. He added a season-high 32 carries for 161 yards and two touchdowns in a GWC road win at Southern Utah.

As a player, Freund went 16-6 as a two-year starter for the Fighting Sioux, finishing his career as the program's most accurate passer. His 68.9 career completion percentage still tops the charts and he also owns the top single-season completion mark of 71.9 that he set as a senior in 2008. He threw for 5,239 yards and 47 touchdowns, which both rank third on the all-time career lists at UND.

Freund returned to Grand Forks after spending the 2010 season as the quarterbacks coach at Carthage College in his hometown of Kenosha, Wis. At Carthage, Freund coached Red Men quarterback Evan Jones, who earned first team all-conference and CCIW Offensive Player of the Year honors in 2010.

In his first year out of college, Freund returned to his high school alma mater and served as the quarterbacks coach on his father's staff at Kenosha St. Joseph.

As a prep athlete playing for his father, Bob, Freund earned Associated Press and Wisconsin Football Coaches' Association first team all-state honors as a senior and holds the state's single season record for touchdown passes (40).

Freund worked as a camp instructor during the 2014 summer at the prestigious Manning Passing Academy.

Freund earned a banking and financial economics degree from UND in 2008 and completed his master's degree in educational leadership in the spring of 2013. He was a two-time All-Academic honoree (2007, NCC; and 2008, Great West) during his college days and was named to the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Hampshire Honor Society as a senior. Freund and his wife, Anne, have a daughter, Jossy.

**JOEL SCHWENZFEIER**

Joel Schwenzfeier will embark on his third season as an assistant coach at his alma mater. After working with the running backs during the 2012 season, Schwenzfeier transitioned back to the side of the ball where he starred for UND and will work with the outside linebackers for his second-straight season.


In his first year working with the outside linebackers, his unit accounted for 38 of the team's 111 tackles for loss, which ranked sixth nationally in the Football Championship Subdivision. The defense also ranked a top the Big Sky in total defense and rush defense.

Sophomore Brian Labat led that group with a team-high 12.0 TFLs, while junior Dayo Idowu had 9.0 and was named ROOT SPORTS Big Sky Player of the Week for his efforts in the win over Stony Brook.

Schwenzfeier made 37 career starts and played in all 44 games at strong safety during a four-year career that spanned from 2007-10. He finished his career with 10 interceptions and tied a UND single-game record with three in the 2009 season-opener at Texas Tech.

Schwenzfeier was named to the media's All-Great West first team following his senior season in 2010. He had three interceptions in that season, including taking one back for a 100-yard touchdown return.

He earned his bachelor's degree in business economics from UND in 2011.

- Offensive line coach **Luke Knauf** will have to replace two starters from last year's unit that came on strong towards the end of the year paving the way for UND's rushing attack to average 170.0 ypg in the final five contests.
- Sophomores **A.J. Stockwell** and **Brandon Miller** both got a taste of starting last season with Stockwell getting the nod at left tackle in the upset of No. 22 Northern Arizona, while Miller replaced Anderson at right guard vs. Montana.

NOTEBOOK

- Sophomore wideout **Josh Seibel** and senior tight end **Zach Adler** led the team in receptions and receiving yards, respectively, during a 2014 season that saw the offense gain just 1,655 yards through the air.
- Seibel, who went catchless through the first six games, hauled in his team-leading 25 receptions over the closing six contests. He had a pair of nine-reception games and caught his first touchdown pass in the regular-season finale at Northern Colorado.
- Adler, who had just one career reception in 20 games entering the 2014 season, finished the season just one catch behind Seibel with 24 and shared the team lead in receiving yards with now departed R.J. McGill at 265.
- Senior **Romon Bridges** missed the 2014 season with a knee injury, but will be healthy for fall camp.
- Sophomore tight end **Kyle Ruhe** had his first collegiate season cut short with a knee injury as well, but showed an ability to make big plays when given the chance. He had three catches for 83 yards, including a 51-yard reception at San Jose State that ended up as the second-longest of the season by a UND receiver.
- Junior **Maverick Edmunds** shifts to the offensive side of the ball for the 2015 season. He worked at his new position during the spring.

- Converted linebacker **Kyle Norberg** is the team's top returning rusher after netting 255 yards on 87 carries. He started four games a season ago before an ankle injury derailed his campaign.
- Norberg, UAB transfer **Ja'Won Arrington** and a trio of true freshmen will be looking to replace senior Jer Garman, whose late-season production helped provided some offseason momentum for the offense.
- Arrington transferred to UND for his final collegiate season after the UAB program was shut down following the 2014 season. He was in Grand Forks for spring drills and showed he can be a work-horse, power back for this offense.
- The young quartet of running backs, which includes **Austin Gordon**, **Brady Oliveira**, **John Santiago** and **Iwarri Smith**, will be asked to provide immediate depth and production for an offense that proved it wants to run the football in 2014. UND ran the ball 443 times last season, while only trying 290 pass attempts.
- At fullback, junior **Dustin Iverson** will take over for Dwayne Pecosky, who was one of the top-blocking fullbacks in the Big Sky a year ago. Pecosky was named an honorable mention All-Big Sky performer. Iverson played in all 12 games and had eight receptions for 53 yards.

His replacement, classmate **Ryan Bartels**, finished the SUU contest, but injured his shoulder during relief duty and also missed the final four games of the campaign.
- Mollberg, who missed spring practices, while Bartels and Studsrud shared the first-team reps, is expected to be at full strength for fall camp.
- Those two injuries resulted in true freshman **Keaton Studsrud**, who had been the scout team quarterback, having his shirt pulled for the final four games. After back-to-back losses, Studsrud engineered a 30-28 upset of No. 22 Northern Arizona and led UND to its first road win of the season at Northern Colorado to close out the season with back-to-back wins.

- UND's secondary will get half of its starters back for the 2015 as senior **Chris Brown** will man one of the cornerback spots and sophomore **Cole Reyes** is back at free safety. Both were first-year starters in 2014 and did not disappoint.
- Brown finished with 29 tackles and took his first career interception back 14 yards for a touchdown late in a tight contest with No. 7 Montana.
- Reyes started all 10 games that he appeared in (missed two with injury) and finished fifth on the team with 59 tackles. He added five pass break-ups, an interception and 5.0 tackles for loss.
- The key will be finding a replacement for **Alex Tillman**, who earned All-Big Sky honors at cornerback following his only season at UND. That spot will likely be manned by sophomores **Chris Carter** or **Deion Harris**, who both played a back-up role as true freshmen in 2014.
- The strong safety position will also need a replacement and senior **William James**, who had four starts to his credit in 2014, along with newcomers **Zach Arnell** and **Jawon Johnson** will be vying for that role.
- Arnell and Johnson were both participants in spring practices after transferring from the JUCO ranks. Arnell was limited to non-contact drills, while he recovered from offseason surgery, and Johnson displayed his prowess as one of the hardest hitters on the team.
- Sophomore **Charles Flowers**, who redshirted for UND last season, will also be in the mix at cornerback.

Senior **Will Ratelle** was the team's top tackler becoming the first UND player to register more than 100 tackles at the Division I level. He finished the campaign with 106 total tackles and added two sacks.
- Fellow inside linebacker **Taj Rich** finished second on the team with 82 tackles after starting all 12 games. He had just two career tackles entering his sophomore campaign, but flourished in 2014, finishing with 11.0 tackles for loss.
- Rich only trailed junior **Brian Labat** for the team lead in TFL's. Labat finished with 12.0 as he also provided great production in his first year as a starter at outside linebacker.
- Rounding out the returning starters is **Dayo Idowu**, who had 61 total tackles and shared the team lead in sacks with 3.5.
- Sophomore **Jake Disterhaupt** found his home at outside linebacker after moving from wide receiver to safety during his redshirt season. Disterhaupt finished the campaign with 34 total tackles, 7.0 tackles for loss and two sacks, while also intercepting a pass.

- Placekicker **Reid Taubenheim** had a strong finish to his rookie season, earning All-Big Sky honors after leading all FCS freshmen with 16 made field goals. Taubenheim's biggest kick was a 35-yarder with four seconds left to complete the 30-28 upset of No. 22 Northern Arizona.
- Sophomore **Mitch Meindel**, who started all 11 games as a freshman in 2013, will reassume the starting duties at punter after classmate **Connor Bolduc** left the program right before fall camp. Meindel averaged 41.7 ypp on 48 attempts as a true freshman in 2013.
- **Jacob Holmen**, who switched numbers from 80 to 82 this season, started the season only doing snaps on placekicks, but eventually took over both snapping duties. He appeared in 11 games and also made three special teams tackles.

Q&A WITH BUBBA SCHWEIGERT

What was your biggest takeaway from year one as a head coach in the Big Sky Conference?

"The Big Sky is a challenging and exciting league to be a part of. I think it creates a lot of challenges for our defense in terms of defending different types of offenses. The league has a reputation of being wide open and scoring lots of points, but there are also a time where teams will run the football and play physical football, so it creates a lot of challenges. Offensively, I think we need to find ways to move the ball more consistently because the defenses are very talented and athletic."

A majority of the team, including members of the 2015 signing class, were on campus for the last summer session of school. How do you think your team will benefit from that extra time together and how will those young players benefit from being here a few weeks before fall camp?

"You always benefit when your team works out together because that is when you build your chemistry. I'm a believe that championships are won in winter, spring and summer and you win the games in the fall. You win the championships by what you do in the winter, spring and summer and obviously build a lot of team chemistry during those times. A lot of our guys make sacrifices during the summer time to stay here and be with the team rather than go home and be with family and friends, so you hope that benefits you in a big way and really helps your team."

"For the young guys, it takes the edge off of fall camp. They get used to working with the strength coaches. They are in the facility, so they get comfortable with that and all the little things, like fitting shoes and those types of things. They are able to get into a routine and build a comfort level with the atmosphere. That is a big benefit for the young guys and we think that helps us when it comes to making decisions on who you are going to play the first year and who you might redshirt."

Offensively, the team started to find its footing late in the year. How do you think that unit will carry that momentum over into the 2015 season?

"Each year is different, but you would hope that those that experienced that will learn and benefit from it. One thing that we found throughout that finish to the season and during spring ball is we are developing who we want to be and what type of team we want to be. And, that is a team that is physical up front, can run the football when we need to and then the play-action pass becomes easier when you are able to move the football on the ground."

Defensively, where do you think a unit that was the top ranked among total defenses in the Big Sky can improve the most?

"We worked really hard on third-down situations in the spring. We have to be better there to take a step in the right direction. We also have to better in not allowing explosive plays. One thing that hurt us in a number of games last year, was not only giving up those third-down plays, but it changed the field position. We want to limit the big plays and get better on third down, so we can get off the field."

What was your assessment of the team after going through a full season and working with them for a second time during spring drills?

"We are a better team right now. We understand who we want to be. We understand the offense better. We understand the defense better. Our challenge right now is we have a difficult schedule, especially early in the year, so we need to be better at the beginning of the year, which is something we will work hard on during fall camp. We'll continue to stress the day-by-day philosophy and getting better at something each day. Hopefully, we are doing that in the summer time and it carries over into fall camp. We want to be the best we can be when we take on Wyoming in the season opener."

In what areas will the 2015 fall camp differ the most from your first year?

"I think the installation will go a lot quicker because there will be more recall. Our guys have played in the system before, so there should be less anxiety and more focus from a number of returning guys. I would hope our leadership is better now that guys know the expectations and having a better feel of how we expect our program to run day-to-day. We still want our guys on edge and excited to start fall camp."







The Big Sky Conference enters its 52nd year and 27th year of women's competition during the 2015-16 academic year. The venerable and stable Division I Big Sky Conference observed its 50th birthday on July 1, 2013.

Four of the current league members – Idaho State University, The University of Montana, Montana State and Weber State – have been with the league since its birth. Fellow charter member the University of Idaho returned most of its sports to the Big Sky on July 1, 2014. Northern Arizona University enters its 46th season in the league, giving the league five members with at least 40 years of continuous membership.

The Big Sky Conference welcomed North Dakota and Southern Utah on July 1, 2012 as full members. UC Davis and Cal Poly joined as football affiliate members and Idaho returned to the league for all sports except football prior to the 2014-15 season. Eastern Washington University, the University of Northern Colorado, Portland State University and Sacramento State round out the current membership.

The league has become one of the strongest Division I conferences in the West and is a national leader in the Football Championship Subdivision. Six times, Big Sky teams have won the Division I National Championship, including Eastern Washington in 2010. A Big Sky team has played for the national championship in three of the past six seasons. The Big Sky is one of three conferences in the western United States playing Division I football.

The Big Sky Conference was established in 1963 by six charter members – Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga, Montana, Montana State and Weber State. Those six schools formed the foundation of the Big Sky before the league expanded in 1970 by adding Boise State and Northern Arizona. Gonzaga left the Sky in 1979 and was replaced by Nevada, which gave the league eight members. The conference grew to nine schools in 1987 with the addition of Eastern Washington.

The 1990s saw change in the makeup of the league, beginning in 1992 when Nevada departed and put the Big Sky back at eight teams. In 1996 Boise State and Idaho left and at the same time the conference added Portland State, Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge. The Big Sky maintained nine teams for five years before Cal State Northridge departed in the spring of 2001.

The Big Sky's full members represent nine states spanning from the Pacific Ocean to the Red River Valley of North Dakota. The league is represented along the entire west coast with institutions in Washington, Oregon and California. League schools also range up and down the Rocky Mountains with institutions in Montana, Idaho, Utah, Arizona and Colorado. It is "The Heart of the American West."

The University of Idaho, which was a member from 1963-96, will once again compete in the Big Sky in the majority of its sports. Idaho's football program will maintain its FBS affiliation, joining the Sun Belt Conference.

On Feb 25, 1963, the name Big Sky was adopted by the six presidents of the charter members as the name of the new conference. The name Big Sky originated in a novel written by the late A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont., in 1947 entitled "The Big Sky." Jack Hollowell, a former Montana advertising director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. While on a track and field trip from Pocatello, Idaho, to Missoula, Mont., legendary Dubby Holt of Idaho State saw a

"Welcome to Big Sky Country" sign as his team entered Montana. Holt, and his athletes thought "Big Sky" would be a perfect name for the new conference. Harry Missildine of the Spokane Spokesman-Review called for the newly formed league to be named the Big Sky Conference in his column dated Feb. 20, 1963.

The Big Sky sponsors championships in 16 sports, including men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, basketball and tennis. In addition, there are also championships in football, and women's volleyball, golf and soccer. The Big Sky sponsored softball for the first time in 2013. Men's golf returns as a championship sport in 2014 for the first time since 2002. The University of Hartford and Binghamton University have joined the Big Sky as affiliate members in golf.

In 1988-89, the Big Sky Conference first began sponsoring women's sports. The former Mountain West Conference existed from 1982-88, sponsoring championships for women's sports at the same institutions the Big Sky had men's programs. The Big Sky merged with the Mountain West in 1988, forming one league for both men and women.

Doug Fullerton, the fifth commissioner of the Big Sky Conference, is in his 20th year at the helm. Fullerton took over the Big Sky on July 1, 1995, replacing longtime commissioner Ron Stephenson, who passed away in 2011. Stephenson served the league for 14 years. Steve Belko was the commissioner from 1977-81, while John Roning held the post from 1971-77. The first league commissioner was Jack Friel, who served from 1963-71.

LOOKING BACK: 2014

FIRSTS FOR SCHWEIGERT

Here is a look at the "firsts" accomplished by Bubba Schweigert during his rookie season as UND's head coach in 2014:

- First win and first home win: 16-13, Robert Morris at home (Sept. 6)
- First Big Sky win: 24-16, Portland State at home (Oct. 4)
- First win over a ranked opponent: 30-28, No. 22 Northern Arizona at home (Nov. 15)
- First road win: 33-14, at Northern Colorado (Nov. 22)

TEXAS TWO-STEPPER

Lone Star State native Alex Tillman burst onto the FCS scene after transferring from Houston (FBS; American Athletic Conference) for his final collegiate season. Tillman, who hails from Houston, owned the second-longest punt return of the season by an FCS player (school record 95-yarder vs. Portland State; Oct. 11) and the fourth-longest interception return by an FCS player (92-yarder vs. Stony Brook). Both returns came in home wins and he was named Big Sky ROOT SPORTS Special Teams and Defensive Player of the Week following those games. Tillman also led the team with eight pass break-ups and was named to the All-Big Sky First Team as a punt returner and All-Big Sky Third Team as a defensive back. He finished with 43 total tackles and also blocked a PAT.

RATELLE REACHES CENTURY MARK

Junior middle linebacker Will Ratelle became the first UND player to reach the century mark in total tackles since Digger Anderson did so in both the 2003 (124) and 2004 (104) seasons. Ratelle's 106 total tackles, included a career-high 14 stops in the victory over Stony Brook (Sept. 20). He led the team in tackles in eight of 12 contests and finished tied for 9th in the Big Sky with 8.8 tpg.


STUFFED BEHIND THE LINE

UND was one of 14 teams in the FCS that registered more than 100 tackles for loss during the 2014 season. The Green and White exceeded the century mark with eight TFL's against the Lumberjacks (Nov. 15) and finished with a Big Sky-best 111 on the season. The defense put up double-digit tackles for loss against an opponent for the fourth time at Eastern Washington on Nov. 1. The team's 15.0 TFL's in that contest was one shy of the unit's season-high of 16.0 TFL's set in the victory over Stony Brook. Sophomore Brian Labat registered a career-high 4.5 TFL's in the Montana game (Oct. 4) and led the team with 12.0 on the season. Labat was joined in double figures by sophomore Taj Rich, who had 11.0 on the season, and freshman Brandon Dranka, who had 10.5. To put things in

better perspective, last year, the UND defense managed just 48.5 TFL's in 11 contests. The defense also collected 34 sacks in 2014, which was 19 more than the unit had in 2013. Senior Garret Reineke led all UND players with five sacks on the season, while Dranka and junior Dayo Idowu each had 3.5 on the campaign.

GARMAN FINDS HIS GROOVE

Senior Jer Garman's emergence as the team's leading rusher helped UND close out the season with back-to-back wins. He had the first four 100-yard rushing days of his career in the team's final five games. His best effort came in the 30-28 upset of No. 22 Northern Arizona when Garman rushed for a career-high 235 yards. That output tied him for the 10th-most in a single game by a FCS running back during the 2014 season. Garman's first 100-yard rushing game came against Southern Utah (Oct. 17) and snapped a streak of 17 straight games that UND's offense went without one (Jake Miller, 108; vs. Valpo on Aug. 29, 2013). Garman finished the campaign with a team-leading 858 rushing yards and seven touchdowns and was voted the team's Most Valuable Offensive Player for his efforts.



Jer Garman put together a strong finish to his UND career, rushing for more yards in his final five games (730), than he had amassed in his first 37 games (641).



SAN JOSE, Calif. -- San Jose State picked up a 42-10 victory over North Dakota in the season opener for both schools Thursday at Spartan Stadium. It was also the debut for head coach Bubba Schweigert, who led a UND team up against an Football Bowl Subdivision opponent for just the seventh time in program history.

Unfortunately, the result was the same as the previous six against a foe from the highest level of NCAA football.

All five of the Spartans' offensive scoring drives were of eight plays or more as the home team controlled the game from the outset. SJSU had 406 yards of total offense, while allowing only 244 to UND.

The visitors got 55 of those on their final drive as senior running back Jer Garman scored UND's lone touchdown of the game on a 7-yard scamper with just over a minute to play. Finding the end zone provided a little boost for a team that will return to Grand Forks next Saturday for its home opener vs. Robert Morris.

"There were some good things that we can take from tonight," Schweigert said. "We have to take this thing one day at a time and keep getting better. We also made some mistakes and a lot of times it was about what we were doing and not necessarily what our opponent was doing."

Trailing 14-0 after SJSU converted its first two drives into touchdowns, UND had its first good chance to score on the visitor's third possession when the ground game spurred by quarterback Joe Mollberg and running back Cedric Simmons worked the ball down to the SJSU 22-yard line.

However, the Spartans came up with a stop on third down when Cleveland Wallace intercepted an underthrown pass intended for senior R.J. McGill. The only turnover by either team in the opening half would keep UND off the scoreboard for the time being and SJSU quarterback Blake Jurich and company answered with another methodical touchdown drive.

This one was capped by a 15-play, 81-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown pass to Shane Smith. The Spartans were 6-for-6 on third-down conversions in their first three drives of the game as UND seemed just a fingertip away from swinging the momentum the other way.

Mollberg got the offense going through the air on the ensuing possession, connecting on a 51-yard pass play to redshirt freshman Kyle Ruhe. It was the first career reception for Ruhe and moved the ball to the SJSU 39-yard line.

After a 13-yard gain by Simmons on the next play moved the ball to SJSU's 26-yard line, the sophomore was flagged for a chop-block penalty that ended up costing the team 15 yards. He quickly got 14 of those yards back on 3rd-and-23 to put the offense back into field goal range.

True freshman Reid Taubenheim would make good on his first career attempt, drilling a 42-yarder for UND's first points of the season.

The Spartans opened their next drive with a 51-yard completion of their own as Jurich found Hansell Wilson behind the UND secondary. UND would buckle down and come up with its initial third-down stop of the game and Austin Lopez, who was 28-for-33 during his career on field goals, missed a 40-yard attempt.

UND had just over a minute to work with on the clock, but after a penalty stalled the drive, Schweigert opted to let the clock run out and send his team into the locker room trailing 21-3.

The Spartans continued to contain the UND offense after the break and tacked on three more second-half touchdowns, including a 40-yard punt return by Tyler Ervin, to put the game away.

After Ervin's punt return, Jurich found Tyler Winston from 18 yards out for the duo's second scoring connection of the game. Winston had a game-high 10

GRAND FORKS, N.D. - A trio of key blocked kicks and a stout defensive effort down the stretch allowed North Dakota to secure a 16-13 victory over Robert Morris in the 49th annual Potato Bowl Saturday at the Alerus Center.

It was also the initial win for first-year head coach Bubba Schweigert and the 28th straight home-opening win for UND (1-1) dating back to 1985.

"I was proud of the effort by our guys tonight," Schweigert said. "We had our back against the wall several times there in the second half and our defense came up big."

The defense did the job down the stretch, but it was a pair of big plays by senior R.J. McGill that put the Green and White ahead for good midway through the third quarter.

After RMU marched down the field on a 14-play, 78-yard drive to open the second half and retake a 13-9 advantage on a 2-yard run by Rameses Owens, the Phoenix native came up with two of the biggest plays of the night.

He brought the ensuing kickoff back 41 yards, setting up the offense on UND's 46-yard line. McGill then capped a four-play, 54-yard drive with a 32-yard touchdown reception where he carried an RMU defender the final four yards for his first touchdown since the 2012 season.

"I was mad after I didn't get in the first time on a similar play earlier in the game, so I was going to do whatever it took to get in," McGill said."

Schweigert's first win of his UND head-coaching tenure came in front of 9,118 fans at the Alerus Center. Those fans saw the defense force three turnovers and freshman kicker Reid Taubenheim connect on three first-half field goals of 20, 35 and 45 yards to help solidify the team's 10th win in the last 11 tries in the annual spud-observing contest.

Defensive end Spencer Cummings blocked both of the Colonials' field goal attempts in the second half, including a 38-yard attempt by Hunter Khaleghi with just over five minutes to play that kept the home team up by three.

The defense would force a punt on RMU's next possession, but a 3-and-out by the UND offense gave the visitors one more chance.

Facing a 4th-and-15 after a sack by junior Garret Reineke, RMU quarterback Luke Brumbaugh had the shotgun snap go off his shin and freshman defensive end Brandon Dranka was there to pounce on the loose ball. With just over a minute left on the clock, quarterback Joe Mollberg was able to kneel down three times to end the contest.

McGill finished with three catches for 65 yards, while Mollberg went 8-for-21 through the air for 155 yards and the scoring strike to his senior wideout.

Owens finished with 199 rushing yards and 156 of those came in the second half, but three turnovers cost the RMU offense that outgained UND's 363-268.

Junior Will Ratelle led the UND defense in tackles for the second straight game, collecting a career-high 13 in the victory.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. -- Missouri State pulled away in the second half to post a 38-0 victory over North Dakota in front of a record home crowd of 18,386 at Plaster Stadium. The Bears (2-1) led 14-0 at halftime and senior quarterback Kierra Harris threw three second-half touchdown passes to put the game away in what was the first meeting between the two teams on the gridiron.

Both teams forced three turnovers in the contest, but the Bears were able to turn theirs into 21 points, while UND (1-2) could not get on the scoreboard following any of Missouri State's three fumbles.

"I was disappointed at halftime because I felt like we missed some opportunities to score and we gave up a score because of a poor decision on special teams and by not protecting the ball when we were backed up," UND head coach Bubba Schweigert said. "I felt like we were still in the game, but we just didn't generate enough on the offensive side.

"Defensively, we made plays to give us some opportunities, but we were not able to convert those into points. We never really had any momentum tonight."

After a scoreless first quarter where the teams combined for five punts, the MSU defense put the first points of the game on the board early in the second quarter. Nose tackle Cecil Bratton fell on a loose ball in the end zone after Joe Mollberg fumbled after being sacked by Sean Bernard.

After the UND offense went three-and-out, junior Garrett Reineke came up with one of those forced fumbles for the visitors on the opening play of Missouri State's next drive. He stripped Julian Burton of the ball after the only completion of the second quarter for MSU and Alec Carrothers recovered the fumble to give UND its best starting position at the MSU 44-yard line.

Mollberg drove UND down to 11-yard line, but missed on a third-down pass and Reid Taubenheim was wide right on a 29-yard field goal attempt to keep the Bears advantage at 7-0.

After four punts and a lost fumble on his team's first five possessions, Missouri State quarterback Kierra Harris was finally able to crack the UND defense on the Bears' final possession of the first half. Harris opened the scoring drive with a 28-yard rush, then capped it with 22 seconds remaining in the half on a 4-yard carry.

That touchdown put Missouri State up by 14 at the half as Harris would go onto account for all four of the Bears' offensive scores. He finished 11-for-16 for 149 yards through the air and added 41 yards on the ground.

Meanwhile, sophomore Joe Mollberg struggled to find a rhythm, finishing 9-for-24 for 70 yards and two interceptions for the visitors, who mustered only seven first downs in the contest and were forced to punt 11 times. It was the first time UND was shutout since the 2010 season opener at Idaho.

Still down only 14, UND's defense forced another turnover on the Bears' opening possession of the second half, but the offense could only move the ball to midfield before freshman Connor Bolduc had to punt for the sixth time in the game.

This time Harris put his team into the end zone thanks to a 37-yard scoring strike to Willis Chambers. His first touchdown pass of the game came on a 3rd-and-9.

Senior Baylee Carr forced UND's third fumble of the game and set up the offense on the 35-yard line, but after a pair of carries by senior Adam Shaugabay, Mollberg was picked off on third down to squelch that scoring chance.

Harris would lead his team to another touchdown on the Bears' ensuing drive, connecting with LeMarcus Stewart from 40 yards out this time to push their lead to 28-0.

The Missouri State defense would force its third turnover early in the fourth quarter when Alex Jones intercepted Mollberg and ran the ball back to the

GRAND FORKS, N.D. - North Dakota found a way once again to protect its home field, registering a 13-3 victory over Stony Brook in the team's final non-conference tune-up Saturday at the Alerus Center. It was a defensive slugfest for the entire 60 minutes, but it was UND (2-2) that made the key plays in the second half to preserve the win over the Seawolves (1-3).

Holding onto a 6-3 lead late the third quarter, the Seawolves had moved the ball down to the UND 7-yard line and were facing a second-and-goal when senior Alex Tillman made the most emphatic of those key plays for the home team's defense. The Houston transfer stepped in front of a John Kinder pass and took UND's first interception of the season back 92 yards for a touchdown.

The extra-point would make the score 13-3, but the Stony Brook defense would not let that lead get any bigger en route to limiting UND to only five first downs and 145 yards of total offense for the game.

Fortunately for the home team, the Green and White defenders stood even taller down the stretch. The Seawolves moved the ball into UND territory on its next two drives after Tillman's pick, but each time failed to score.

Senior Baylee Carr forced a fumble on a third-and-long that teammate Dayo Idowu recovered. Then, after another three-and-out by the offense, linebackers Taj Rich and Garrett Reineke stuffed a 4th-and-2 attempt by SBU on the opening play of the fourth quarter to once keep the Seawolves at bay.

Rich finished with a career-high and UND Division I single-game record 19 total tackles as he and fellow inside linebacker Will Ratelle combined for 33 stops in the game. Ratelle set a career-high for the third time this season with 14 stops, while the UND defense had seven sacks and 16 tackles for a loss in the contest.

Stony Brook would not get past midfield again and Idowu would put a stamp on the defensive effort by forcing a fumble and recovering it with less than a minute to play.

Even though the UND offense could not find much traction in the contest, the unit did provide some fireworks in the second quarter when sophomore Joe Mollberg found freshman Dev Ferguson on a 68-yard scoring strike. The touchdown came after Tillman had muffed a punt, setting up SBU on the UND 22-yard line. The defense did not break through, forcing a 36-yard field goal attempt by Graham Ball that was good for the first points of the game.

Converted linebacker Kyle Norberg got UND's scoring drive started with a 4-yard rush, then on 2nd-and-6 from his own 32-yard line, Mollberg threw a high-arching pass right into the arms of Ferguson, who broke through a shoe-string tackle attempt and raced into the end zone for his first collegiate score.

Norberg got the start at running back, but was held in check for most of the evening finishing with 53 net yards on 27 carries. He was playing linebacker up until two weeks ago, but made the switch prior to the Missouri State game where he rushed five times for 24 yards. Ferguson's touchdown grab equaled the team's offensive output from its opening 18 plays and it would end up being the second and final completion of the game for Mollberg. He only attempted seven passes as the Seawolves yielded only six yards of offense to UND in the closing

SBU managed only 49 rushing yards on 46 attempts in the contest and got a majority of its 221 yards of total offense through the air (172). Tight end Will Tye had 103 of those receiving yards on a game-high five receptions.

BOZEMAN, Mont. -- No. 13 Montana State used a big second quarter to hold off North Dakota 29-18 in the Big Sky opener for both teams Saturday at Bobcat Stadium. The Bobcats (3-2, 1-0 BSC) scored 23 points in that second quarter that saw them extend what was a 3-0 lead entering the stanza into a 26-7 margin by halftime.

That would be enough scoring for the Bobcats, who came into the contest as the second-highest scoring unit in the Big Sky at more than 40 points per game and put up 118 points combined against UND over the past two seasons.

"This one got away from us in the second quarter. That is what got us," UND head coach Bubba Schweigert said. "I thought we came out in the second half and played much better, especially in the fourth quarter. We just have to play smarter and avoid some of those costly mistakes. Those really hurt us today."

UND's offense sputtered in the first half with the team's lone score coming on a 21-yard fumble return by Will Ratelle, but showed signs of life after the break to make things interesting down the stretch.

Senior R.J. McGill equaled his career-high seven catches and 63 yards and his 8-yard touchdown reception with just over five minutes to play put UND (2-3, 0-1 BSC) within 11 points. Junior Miguel Cerriteno added four grabs for 26 yards in what was his first extensive action of his UND career.

After holding the Bobcats to a punt, sophomore quarterback Joe Mollberg drove his team back into MSU territory with under a minute to play, but a 52-yard field goal attempt by Reid Taubenheim was blocked to keep the lead at two scores.

The Bobcats, who had put up 51 points in a loss to No. 2 Eastern Washington a week ago, would run out the clock and escape with a victory over a team they have won three straight against.

UND came into the contest ranked second in the Big Sky in total defense and proved that was no fluke. Montana State managed just 329 yards of total offense for the game after entering the contest averaging nearly 500 yards per contest.

Meanwhile, UND's offense finished with a season-high 293 yards of total offense. Redshirt freshman Kyle Norberg finished with 19 carries for 73 yards. He had 57 of those coming after halftime when the offense finally got on track. Mollberg completed 22-of-37 passes for a season-high 222 yards.

Ratelle would lead a UND defensive effort with nine tackles as that unit held Montana State all-everything running back Shawn Johnson to 120 all-purpose yards after he set a school-record with 374 yards against the Eagles last week.

After the Bobcats' offense managed just a 34-yard field goal by Luke Daly in the opening quarter, it was the MSU defense that got the home team into the end zone on a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown by Khari Garcia.

That put Montana State in front 10-0 and after forcing a three-and-out, Johnson capped a four-play, 49-yard drive with a 16-yard touchdown run that quickly made the score 16-0. The Bobcats went for two, but that attempt failed.

On UND's next drive, Mollberg connected with Dev Ferguson on a big pass play for the second straight game, but MSU safety Eryon Barnett knocked the ball away from the true freshman four yards away from the end zone.

The Bobcats would run the fumble back to their 46-yard line, but MSU quarterback Dakota Prukup would give the ball right back after a sack by Javen Butler jarred the ball loose and Ratelle scooped up the loose pigskin and put UND on the scoreboard with a 21-yard return.

Prukup would lead his team to 10 more points, however, in the closing three minutes of the first half to make it 26-7 contest at the break. He finished 17-of-24 for 269 yards and touchdown.

GRAND FORKS, N.D. - A battle between two of the Big Sky Conference's top-ranked defenses lived up to its billing as No. 7 Montana edged host North Dakota, 18-15 Saturday afternoon at the Alerus Center. Daniel Sullivan's 35-yard field goal as time expired provided the winning margin for the Grizzlies (4-2, 2-0 BSC).

Both defenses were stout throughout as North Dakota (2-4, 0-2 BSC) did not allow a rush for positive yardage until the second quarter and Montana held the home team to just 60 yards of total offense in the first half.

"The plan was to win the game," UND head coach Bubba Schweigert said. "Offensively, when we eliminate the mistakes, we can move the football. We'll find some positives, but the plan is execute for 60 minutes. We had a chance to close out the game and get a win, but we didn't do that today."

UM was able to take advantage of a few UND miscues in the opening half, garnering two points on a safety after a low snap got by Joe Mollberg and later getting a touchdown on a drive that was extended on a late hit call after an apparent third-down stop.

At the half, both teams combined for just 197 yards of total offense and the Grizzlies went into the locker room with an 8-0 advantage.

After Montana went ahead 15-0 early in the second half on Travon Van's second touchdown of the afternoon, North Dakota's offense found its footing in the fourth quarter. The unit had half of its total offense in the final stanza, but the Grizzlies recovered a Kyle Norberg fumble on their own 4-yard line to keep their shutout alive.

UND would force one of several three-and-outs with the Grizzlies backed up and this time Norberg would find paydirt. Mollberg and company strung together a 10-play drive that featured a pair of fourth-down conversions ending in a 2-yard plunge by Kyle Norberg. The red-shirt freshman's first collegiate touchdown sliced the deficit to 15-7.

The defense would score a touchdown for a third consecutive week on UM's ensuing possession when junior Chris Brown intercepted a third-down pass and raced it back 14 yards for a score. Brown's first career interception made it a 15-13 contest and Mollberg would roll out and fire a 2-point conversion pass to tight end Luke Mathewson to knot the score at 15-15.

The UND defense would force Montana into its seventh punt of the game following another three-and-out. Mollberg would then drive his team down to the 23-yard line, setting up a 40-yard field goal attempt by Reid Taubenheim.

The Grizzlies would come up with the block, however, as the snap was not held cleanly. Montana quickly moved down the field thanks to a 46-yard pass completion hauled in by Jamaal Jones, who finished with game-highs of seven catches and 114 receiving yards.

Griz running back Jordan Canada, who had trouble getting on track all day, was stopped for a five-yard loss on the next play, but Daniel Sullivan drilled the game-winner from 40 yards out after missing a 21-yard attempt and extra-point earlier in the contest.

Defensively, North Dakota had 14 tackles for loss, including a pair of sacks. Brian LaBat had 4.5 tackles for loss, three quarterback hurries

GRAND FORKS, N.D. - Senior Alex Tillman's school-record 95-yard punt return for a score in the fourth quarter helped host North Dakota to a 24-16 win over Portland State in Big Sky Conference play Saturday afternoon at the Alerus Center. It was Tillman and the UND defense that had to withstand eight plays from inside its own 20-yard line on the Vikings' final drive, punctuated by a game-ending stop by Dayo Idwuwo on the 2-yard line as the clock ran out.

The UND (3-4, 1-2 BSC) victory snapped the program's longest losing skid in Homecoming contests at four and gave head coach Bubba Schweigert his first league win. The last three contests with the Vikings (2-4, 1-1 BSC) have all been decided by eight points or less.

In this one, the second-half belonged to the home team as UND outscored the Vikings 21-3 after halftime with backup quarterback Ryan Bartels in relief of Joe Mollberg. UND's starting signal caller left in the first quarter due to injury and Bartels stepped in and finished the day 14-of-23 for 151 yards and a touchdown.

Redshirt freshman Josh Seiber entered the game without a catch, but corralled a team-high nine receptions for 60 yards and Zach Adler added a career-high seven catches for 66 yards and his first career touchdown.

The day did not start great for UND, however, as the Vikings opened the scoring on a 50-yard touchdown pass from Kieran McDonagh to Steve Coury just over four minutes into the game.

After the teams traded punts on their ensuing possessions, Mollberg started a 14-play, 72-yard drive that resulted in UND's first points of the game thanks to a 35-yard field goal by Reid Taubenheim. Unfortunately, he was unable to finish the series after getting a first down on a short third-down gain.

Bartels relieved him and, after two handoffs, missed on his first pass attempt to set up the field goal. He was just 2-for-6 in the first half, but the sophomore, who started seven games a year ago, would settle down at halftime and fuel a third-quarter rally after his team went into the break trailing 13-3.

Bartels finished the stanza 11-for-15 through the air for 135 yards and scored on a 1-yard rush and found Adler on an 8-yard strike to give UND its first lead of the game at 17-13. UND came into the contest having not scored more than one offensive touchdown in a game, but the back-up signal caller engineered a pair of seven-point drives in just under 12 minutes of game action. The offense was 5-for-5 on third-down conversions during the third quarter and finished 8-for-14 for the game.

Clinging to a 17-16 lead, sophomore Brian Labat sacked McDonagh for a 15-yard loss to take the Vikings out of a field goal range. After taking a delay of game penalty, Kyle Loomis hit a line drive punt 41 yards that Tillman fielded going backwards and after making one man miss, raced the ball all the way back for his second return touchdown of the season (92-yard INT return vs. Stony Brook). Tillman's heroics made it a 24-16 contest, but the victory was not in hand until the defense made a goal-line stand in the final seconds.

It was a wild final series that saw the Vikings start at the UND 18-yard line after Kasey Closs returned a Connor Bolduc punt 27 yards. PSU extended the drive once by converting a fourth down thanks to an 8-yard

CEDAR CITY, Utah - Southern Utah quarterback Ammon Olsen accounted for five touchdowns as he led the Thunderbirds to a 35-17 victory over North Dakota in Big Sky play Saturday on a windy day at Eccles Coliseum.

The T-birds (2-7, 2-2 BSC) were in control at halftime, holding a 21-3 advantage, but a strong start to the second half by UND (3-5, 1-3 BSC) made things interesting into the fourth quarter.

UND's second-half spark was aided by a pair of touchdown drives that were led by back-up quarterback Ryan Bartels and capped by Jer Garman rushing scores to make it a 21-17 contest early in the final stanza. Garman finished with the first 100-yard rushing game of his career, carrying a career-high 25 times for 102 yards.

The UND defense would hold SUU to a three-and-out following Garman's second touchdown scamper of the day, but the home team was able to make the first turnover of the game by either team a costly one. Chinedu Ahanonu, the Big Sky's leading tackler, picked off a Bartels pass and raced it back for an apparent touchdown, but his return was called back due to a personal foul penalty.

The setback would be only temporary, however, as Olsen made UND pay on the first play from scrimmage though as he found Mike Sharp on a screen pass and the receiver did the rest of the work, covering 37 yards for a touchdown.

"I'm just disappointed for the first time this year," UND head coach Bubba Schweigert said. "We did not have the right energy level and that competitive spirit to make plays."

UND would get inside SUU territory again, but facing a 4th-and-4 from the 46-yard line with just over 10 minutes to play, Schweigert opted to punt and play defense. Unfortunately, after a fair catch at their own 13-yard line, the T-Birds would turn a short pass into a big gain once again. This time Raysean Pringle took a swing pass from the BYU transfer on a check-down route 87 yards to put the game out of reach at 35-17 with just over 10 minutes left on the clock.

Olsen finished with four passing touchdowns and a rushing score as SUU snapped a three-game Big Sky losing skid. Bartels finished 23-of-44 for 297 yards after replacing an injured Joe Mollberg for the second week in a row.

"I thought we threw the ball pretty well (to start the second half) and made some big plays in the run game. Kyle (Norberg) popped one there on short yardage and gave us some life," Schweigert added. "We had some opportunities to get turnovers and just missed, but we got back in it and when you get back in it, you have to continue to keep making plays. It's a one-play-at-a-time deal and we let it slip away. I felt like we didn't do anything to keep the momentum going."

Olsen went 14-for-15 for 139 yards and threw two scores and rushed for one more as SUU jumped out to that 18-point advantage at the break. SUU took the momentum and never relinquished it in the opening 30 minutes after stopping running back Kyle Norberg on a fourth-down attempt from the T-Birds' 43-yard line.

Olsen then marched SUU down the field on a nine-play, 58-yard drive that he capped with a four-yard pass to Naia Ursua to put the home team on the score-board.

UND got points out of its next drive, but lost Mollberg for the game in doing so. He was sacked on second down of the ensuing drive and did not return. Bartels relieved him and drove the visitors down to the SUU 13-yard line, but the team had to settle for a 30-yard field goal by Reid Taubenheim.

SUU would have to punt on its next possession, but the T-Birds' defense would come up big again. With UND lined up in punt formation facing a 4th-and-1 from its own 29-yard line, freshman Brandon Dranka took a direct snap from his up-back position, but was held to no gain giving the ball back to the home team.

It only took Olsen three plays to find the end zone this time as he scored with

CHENEY, Wash. - No. 6/7 Eastern Washington used a big second quarter to post a 54-3 Homecoming victory over North Dakota on Saturday at Roos Field in Big Sky play.

UND's defense held EWU's potent offense in check for the opening stanza, allowing only 74 yards of total offense and a 3-yard touchdown run by Quincy Forte, but that unit led by back-up quarterback Jordan West picked up 214 yards and three touchdowns in that explosive second quarter that saw the Eagles (8-2, 5-1 BSC) put the game out of reach.

"Eastern Washington is a good offensive football team. They have a lot of explosive players and a lot of players that can make plays. As a defense, you have to go downhill and you cannot play on your heels and that was an issue for us today," UND head coach Bubba Schweigert said. "Offensively, we just could not get anything going there in the second quarter to keep our defense off the field."

West finished with 314 yards and two touchdowns in what was his fourth start replacing All-American Vernon Adams in the starting lineup.

EWU was also apt at picking up key conversions, going 6-for-11 on third down and converting a fourth down on three of its four offensive touchdown drives in the first half. Meanwhile, UND (3-6, 1-4 BSC) converted only one third down in the game (12 attempts) as it never got on track, finishing with 157 yards of total offense.

The Eagles' defense accounted for the other touchdown in the 31-point second stanza as Moe Roberts returned an interception 26 yards to put the home team up 31-0.

True freshman quarterback Keaton Studsrud started and made his debut for UND after its top two quarterbacks were injured in last week's loss at Southern Utah. He led the offense to a pair of first downs on the opening drive, but the Eagles' defense would allow only two more the rest of the half.

Those both came on UND's lone scoring drive, which Reid Taubenheim ended with a 38-yard field goal. The true freshman's seventh field goal of the season was set up thanks to a career-long 25-yard carry by Jer Garman and a 19-yard rush on a fly sweep by Josh Seibel.

Garman finished with 18 carries for 92 yards in his second-straight productive game in the starting role. Unfortunately, West and company had just enough time to tack on the team's fifth touchdown of the opening half with three seconds left in the half after Shaq Hill caught an underneath screen pass and found the end zone from 15 yards out.

On their opening drive, the Eagles converted a pair of third-downs and added a fourth-down conversion as Forte capped that 15-play drive with a 3-yard touchdown scamper. The drive took the opening seven minute and 12 seconds off the clock and set the tone for the rest of the game.

Studsrud completed his first collegiate pass to Seibel for nine yards and moved the ball into EWU territory on the opening possession, but the team was forced to punt. He finished 5-for-19 in his collegiate debut for 37 yards.

Forte had 14 carries for 55 yards and two touchdowns in the opening half and All-American wide receiver Cooper Kupp added six catches for 64 yards and his 12th receiving touchdown of the season. The prolific sophomore finished with his 12th 100-yard receiving game, leading all receivers with nine catches for 111 yards.

UND returns home for its next two Big Sky games, starting next Saturday with its first-ever game against Weber State. Kickoff with the Wildcats is set for Noon CT at the Alerus Center.

GRAND FORKS, N.D. - Visiting Weber State took a 17-point first-half lead and held on for a 24-12 victory over North Dakota in the first gridiron meeting between the two programs Saturday at the Alerus Center. The Wildcats (1-9, 1-5 BSC) snapped a nine-game losing skid and won for the first time during the Jay Hill-era, while UND (3-7, 1-5 BSC) dropped its third straight contest.

Senior Jer Garman rushed for a career-high 137 yards for the home team, but the Wildcats would hold UND's aerial attack to 115 yards and pick off true freshman Keaton Studsrud twice in the first half.

Weber State's offense struggled on the ground, which has been the norm for UND's opponents this season, gaining just 41 yards on 36 attempts, but sophomore signal caller Jadrian Clark did enough through the air to carve out his team's initial league triumph. Clark finished 19-for-31 for 235 yards and three touchdown passes.

Studsrud, who was making just his second career start, pulled his team to within 24-10 just over midway through the third quarter on a 23-yard scoring strike to Tucker Nordby, but that would be the lone touchdown of the day for UND and only a late safety given up by Weber State would make the final deficit 12 points.

Redshirt freshman Cole Reyes came up with his first-career interception early in the fourth quarter and ran it back 46 yards into Weber State territory at the 48-yard line, but the Wildcats' defense held UND to a quick three-and-out to squelch the potential momentum shift.

After the teams traded punts and still trailing 24-10, UND got the ball back at its own 10-yard line with just over five minutes to play. Garman reeled off a career-long, 50-yard run on the first play to move the ball to the Weber State 40-yard line.

Studsrud would later keep the drive alive with an 11-yard carry on fourth down, but UND would come up empty on its next fourth-down conversion attempt to end any chance of a late comeback.

In the first half, too many miscues and wide receiver Cam Livingston were North Dakota's biggest issues as the visitors jumped out to a 17-3 advantage and would never trail in the game.

Livingston had four catches for 107 yards in the opening 30 minutes and all went for 20-plus yards. He finished with five grabs for 116 yards and his first catch of the day came on a 3rd-and-10 and helped set up the Wildcats' first points of the game on a 42-yard field goal by Josh Kealamakia.

Those three points came after Alex Tillman had set up UND at midfield with a 32-yard punt return. On the first play of the ensuing drive, Studsrud threw a deep pass to Josh Seibel that the redshirt freshman was able to dive for and get his hands on, but unfortunately the ball bounced right into the waiting arms of Weber State cornerback Deon'tae Florence.

Florence ran the ball back to the Wildcats' 49-yard line to set up the first scoring drive. Livingston added a 36-yard catch on Weber State's next drive, converting another 3rd-and-long, but Kealamakia would miss from 46 yards out on that drive.

In the second quarter, the Wildcats benefitted from a poor snap by UND's punt unit and took over at the home team's 3-yard line. Two plays later, Clark found Shaydon Kehano for his seventh touchdown reception of the season to put the visitors ahead 10-0.

Livingston would set up WSU's second touchdown of the opening half after making a diving catch, which was good for 28 yards and got his team down to the UND 1-yard line. That came with his team facing a 2nd-and-19. Clark would find Jake Kahawahi this time on another 3-yard strike to make it a 17-0 contest.

After Weber State took its opening drive of the second half down for a touchdown, Studsrud returned the favor with a 13-play, 75-yard drive that saw the offense convert a pair of fourth downs. The second was the scoring play where Studsrud and Nordby connected on the first scoring play of both players' careers.

GRAND FORKS, N.D. - Running back Jer Garman enjoyed a career-day and Reid Taubenheim's 35-yard field with four ticks remaining made sure North Dakota's 15 seniors went home winners in their final home game at the Alerus Center.

Garman rushed 28 times for a career-high 235 yards and two touchdowns, while Taubenheim's third field goal of the day split the uprights and provided UND with a thrilling 30-28 Big Sky victory over No. 22 Northern Arizona Saturday.

The victory allowed UND (4-7, 2-5 BSC) to snap a three-game losing skid and end a four-game winning streak for the Lumberjacks (7-4, 5-2 BSC), who came into the contest controlling their own destiny for the Big Sky's automatic FCS playoff bid. It was the first win over a ranked foe for UND since defeating South Dakota 38-37 in dramatic fashion on Senior Day in 2011.

UND dominated the opening half of play to build a 24-7 halftime advantage, but the Lumberjacks have been accustomed to close games all season in league play and would eventually rally to take a 28-27 lead five minutes into the fourth quarter.

NAU's only lead came on a trick play when wide receiver Alex Holmes took a lateral from quarterback Chase Cartwright and fired a pass to tight end Beau Gardner, who was wide open and trotted in from 58 yards out to make it a 28-27 contest.

The Lumberjacks would force UND to punt on its next two possessions, but the home team's defense would manage to do the same to the NAU offense to keep the comeback hopes alive.

After a touchback on a punt by Ryan Hawkins, true freshman Keaton Studsrud would start the game-winning field goal drive on his own 20-yard line with 2:05.

In a game dominated by the ground game, Studsrud used his arm to move his team into NAU territory. He connected with Josh Seibel on the first play for 14 yards, then after a false start penalty found senior Tyrre Ivery for 29 yards to get down the 32-yard line.

After losing three yards, Garman then picked up 14 on a 2nd-and-13. That big gain allowed him to set the ball up in the middle of the field on the next play with a 3-yard carry and Taubenheim did the rest from there.

NAU tried to keep lateralling the ball on the ensuing kickoff, but sophomore Maverick Edmunds pounced on the loose ball at the NAU 15-yard line to seal the win.

It was all UND in the first half thanks to all three facets of the game. Garman rushed for 124 yards in the opening 30 minutes and his two touchdowns both came on one-play scoring drives for a Green and White offense that churned out a season-high 297 yards on the ground for the game.

Garman's first rushing score came from four yards out after Hawkins could not handle a snap in his own end zone and had to run it out to avoid a safety. His 4-yard scamper put UND ahead 7-0.

Senior Alex Tillman would then return a Hawkins' punt 31 yards to the NAU 46-yard line and a block in the back on the Lumberjacks would tack on 10 more yards of field position.

Studsrud and Garman would cover those 36 yards on the ground in eight plays and the rookie signal caller would cap the drive on a 1-yard sneak to make it a 14-0 contest.

Cartwright would finally get the NAU offense on track, cutting his team's deficit in half after Marquice Paige scored on a 1-yard run of his own.

Garman had an emphatic answer to Paige's score as he took the opening play of UND's next drive 78 yards, outracing a pair of Lumberjack defenders to quickly put his team back ahead by two touchdowns.

Studsrud completed his only two passes of the first half on the opening drive, then the next 25 plays of the stanza would all be on the ground.

Ten of those rushes came on a drive after senior Spencer Cummings blocked his third kick of the season. This one was a 44-yard attempt by Hawkins, who handled all the kicking for NAU and was the three-time reigning ROOT SPORTS Big Sky Special Teams Player of the Week.

Cartwright finished the day 22-for-39 for 316 yards and a touchdown with most of that damage coming in the second half. He led his team to a pair of third-quarter touchdowns to trim the deficit to 24-21 before Taubenheim made a 32-yard field goal three minutes into the final quarter.

GREELEY, Colo. - North Dakota forced six turnovers and Jer Garman rushed for 164 yards and two touchdowns in a 33-14 victory over Northern Colorado in Big Sky play Saturday at Nottingham Field.

"We came out here and were the more physical team today," Schweigert said. "We ran the football well, we were able to stop the run, we got some picks and stripped the ball out a couple of times and we played really well on special teams. When you do those things, most times you will get the result that we did today."

It was the widest margin of victory for either team in the series that was dead-locked at 13-13 coming into the game since a 52-24 win by UNC (3-8, 2-6 BSC) in 1998.

Garman finished with his fourth 100-yard game of the season - all in the last five games - and scored his sixth and seven rushing touchdowns of the season.

Defensively, the six turnovers are a single-game high in the Division I era (since 2008) as the unit came up with four fumble recoveries and two interceptions. Senior Garret Reineke forced two of those fumbles and had a sack, while classmate Spencer Cummings added a forced fumble, a sack and three tackles for loss in their final collegiate games.

UND took its opening drive 70 yards on eight plays for a touchdown to quickly move ahead. True freshman Keaton Studsrud was 2-for-2 on the drive for 38 yards, including an 11-yard scoring strike to Josh Seibel.

After the teams exchanged punts, UNC took over on its own 47-yard line. Following a rush for no gain, Cummings forced the first Bears' turnover of the game when he knocked the ball loose from quarterback Sean Rubalcaba and Brandon Dranka recovered for UND at the Bears' 42-yard line.

Garman carried five times on the six-play drive, covering all 42 yards and found the end zone from eight yards out to make it a 14-0 contest.

UND's defense would force another turnover inside UNC territory on the next Bears' possession. This time Deion Harris came down with his first career interception, setting up UND at the 47-yard line.

The offense moved the ball down to the UNC 30-yard line, but had to settle for a 47-yard field goal by Reid Taubenheim. The successful boot was the longest of the true freshman's season and made it a 17-0 advantage for UND.

The Bears picked off Studsrud late in the first half to give them their best chance to score before the break, but the UND defense once again stood tall and forced a UNC punt, allowing the visitors to take their 17-point lead into halftime.

On UNC's opening possession of the second half, the Bears fumbled on a third-down handoff and Brian Labat was there to fall on the loose ball at the UNC 31-yard line.

Taubenheim was called on again to try a long field goal and was good from 47 yards out for the second time in the game to make it 20-0.

Dimitri Stimpfil got UNC on the board on the ensuing possession, taking a screen pass 85 yards for a touchdown.

UNC would force a three-and-out on UND's next possession, but junior Domo Blackmon picked off Rubalcaba on the Bears' next drive and set UND up with a 1st-and-goal at the 4-yard line. Garman dove in two plays later for his second rushing score of the game and pushed the lead to 27-7.

The defense was not done forcing turnovers in the third quarter as Reineke came through with a forced fumble after he sacked Rubalcaba near midfield to stall another UNC drive.

Taubenheim would add two more field goals in the fourth quarter from 36 and 38 yards out, respectively, to put his team up 33-7. Stimpfil would add a late 23-yard score for the Bears to cap the scoring. He set UNC's Division I career receiving yards mark in the contest with nine catches for 157 yards and both of the Bears' touchdowns.

It was also the fifth time this season, UND had double-digit tackles for loss in a game (113 total for the season) ... Freshman Reid Taubenheim made a season-high four field goals (47, 47, 38, 36) and hit from a career-long 47 yards out twice to finish the season 16-for-21.

MISSION

It is our mission to physically and mentally prepare the student-athlete for the rigors of collegiate athletics by implementing professionally designed, scientifically sound training programs, designed specifically to reduce the incidence of injury and help each team and student-athlete reach their full athletic potential.

PHILOSOPHY

We believe that strength and conditioning is crucial to the complete development of the student-athlete. The philosophy of our strength and conditioning program is based on the belief that what occurs in the weight room and field transfers to the playing surface. We train sport specifically with the goal of enhancing athleticism. We also believe in the importance of work ethic, attitude, accountability and mental toughness and that these qualities can be developed and enhanced through our strength and conditioning program.

At the University of North Dakota, one program, functioning behind the scenes, but which should not be taken lightly, is the strength and conditioning program. The strength and conditioning program at UND is among the finest in Division I and vital to the success of all UND athletic teams. The strength and conditioning staff commits themselves to the development of size, strength, power, speed, agility, conditioning, and body composition of each student-athlete. The goal of the strength staff is to develop the athlete and team to reach their maximum potential throughout their career while staying injury free.

Nate Baukol, director of strength and conditioning, oversees the program and facilities. Baukol has three full-time assistant coaches and two graduate assistant coach to assist him.

Together they direct and monitor the training of over 450 student-athletes in 20 sports at UND. UND also boasts some of the finest strength training facilities around. The facilities include the Ralph Engelstad Arena weight room, the Memorial Stadium weight room, and the Hyslop Sports Center weight room.

Training has become a year-round activity, with a student-athlete spending as much time on physical development as any other part of their sport throughout the year. Student-athletes follow either off-season or in-season programs, which are individualized specific to the athlete and sport. Off-season programs are five days a week, summer months included.

Each athlete receives a comprehensive summer training manual to follow, given that a member of the strength staff won't be supervising them. In-season programs are typically 45-minute sessions, two to three days per week, supervised by the strength and conditioning staff.

The University of North Dakota's football weight room and locker room in Memorial Stadium offer our football players outstanding facilities in which to train and prepare themselves to compete in one of the toughest conferences in FCS football.

The weight training facility and equipment was provided with the assistance of Jim and Joann McKay, UND Class of 1955 and John and Brenda Miller, UND Class of 1980.

#14 Corey Colehour
Quarterback
1964-66

Colehour helped lead UND to a 25-4 record and two North Central Conference championships during his three years as the Fighting Sioux starting quarterback. During Colehour's years, North Dakota played in its first two postseason games, winning both, and achieved a No. 10 UPI national ranking in 1965 and a No. 7 Associated Press national ranking in 1966.

The 1966 team averaged 34 points per game, a scoring average exceeded only one other time in UND history (38 points per game in 1972). Colehour still holds the NCC and UND record of six touchdown passes in a single game.

A team tri-captain in 1966, Colehour was All-NCC in both 1965 and 1966 and was the NCC and UND most valuable back those same years. In 1966, he was named most valuable back in the Pecan Bowl after North Dakota beat Parson 42-24.

Colehour still ranks in the top 10 of virtually every UND passing category, and is tied for most career 250-yard passing games (eight) and most touchdown passes in a single season (19).

Colehour became the first UND player to play in the postseason Senior Bowl all-star game (1967). He threw a touchdown pass in that game. Colehour was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons in the sixth round of the 1967 NFL draft and played with the Falcons in 1967 and 1968. He played with the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League from 1968 through 1970.

Colehour is a native of Minneapolis, Minn., where he graduated from Southwest High School in 1963. He graduated from UND in 1968 with a degree in education. Colehour was inducted into the UND Hall of Fame in 1983 and was named to the UND All-Century team in 1993.

Said former UND Head Coach Marv "Whitey" Helling about Colehour, "Corey was an exceptional quarterback on a very good team, and he was a master of taking advantage of his teammates' collective abilities."

#77 Dave Fennell
Defensive Tackle
1971-73

A three-year starter for the Fighting Sioux, Fennell earned all-North Central Conference honors in 1973. After graduating from UND in 1974, Fennell played with the Edmonton Eskimos for 10 seasons.

He helped guide North Dakota to conference titles in 1971 and 1972. The Fighting Sioux went 10-1 in 1972 and defeated Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo 38-21 in the Camelia Bowl. During Fennell's three seasons at UND, North Dakota went 22-8-1.

A native of Edmonton, Alberta, Fennell was named the Outstanding Canadian Player as well as the Outstanding Defensive Player in the 1982 Grey Cup. He helped lead the Eskimos to five straight Grey Cup titles from 1978-1982.

Fennell was inducted into the CFL Hall of Fame in 1990 and was named one of the

CFL's Top 50 players of the modern era by TSN in 2006.

"The thing about David was that he wanted to excel," said Jerry Olson, UND's head coach from 1968-77. "He was big, strong, fast and very intelligent. He was a great player and a great competitor. I never saw him overmatched in any game we played."

#2 Dwayne 'Red' Jarrett
Running Back
1928-30

Glenn "Red" Jarrett enrolled at UND in 1927 after an illustrious athletic career at Grand Forks Central High School. While at UND, he excelled in football, basketball and track, earning three letters in each sport while wearing the Green & White.

Jarrett was selected as UND's first All-American football player in 1930, and was also named the "Back of the Year" in the same year by the New York Herald Tribune. He scored the only touchdown allowed by the great Army team of 1930, the eventual national championship team. Following that game, the New York press nicknamed Jarrett, the "Red Rabbit of the Prairie."

Following his eventful playing career at UND, Red served as UND's head football coach in 1942 and from 1946 to 1948. He also was the head basketball coach for UND in 1945-46 and from 1949-1951, and served as the Athletic Director and head track coach from 1946 to 1958. As the Athletic Director, Red Jarrett was instrumental in UND's move to Division 1 collegiate hockey competition in 1947, leading to one of the finest programs in the NCAA.

Jarrett was inducted into the UND Athletic Hall of Fame in 1975. He died at the age of 53 on April 26, 1962.

#54 Jim LeClair
Linebacker
1970-71

A first-team AFCA and AP All-America selection and the North Central Conference Most Valuable Player in 1971, Jim LeClair was one of the best linebackers ever to play at the University of North Dakota.

LeClair, who also earned All-NCC honors in 1970 and 1971, was drafted by the NFL's Cincinnati Bengals in the third round of the 1972 draft. He became a starting middle linebacker in 1974 and was named team captain in 1975, the same year he was named Bengals MVP. LeClair was named All-Pro in 1976 and also earned first alternate All-Pro status five other seasons. The Leclair-led Bengals played San Francisco in Super Bowl XVI, which is still considered one of the most exciting Super Bowls ever to be played.

The South St. Paul, Minn., native held the Bengals team captain moniker until 1983, when he began a two-year stint with the USFL's N.J. Generals. He earned All-Pro honors in 1984 and retired from professional football in 1985.

Jerry Olson, UND head coach from 1968-77, said in 1971, "Jim is a very complete football player: one of the best I've ever coached. He is a very intelligent and dedicated athlete."

#14 Errol Mann
Kicker
1965-66

A two-year letter winner at UND, Errol Mann went on to enjoy a 12-year career in the National Football League. Mann was named to the All-North Central Conference team in 1965 and 1966 and set a then-school record with 11 field goals during the 1966 North Central Conference Championship season, while scoring 70 points.

After graduating in 1967, Mann signed with Denver of the American Football League and had a part in history. His two field goals were the difference in a 13-7 win over the Detroit Lions, the first time an AFL team defeated an NFL squad.

However, a serious thigh injury suffered later that season put Mann's pro career in jeopardy. Told he would never be able to kick again, Mann was released by Denver, Cleveland and Green Bay. But he persevered and caught on with Detroit in 1969, setting franchise records for points by a kicker and field goals in the process.

Mann would spend eight seasons with Detroit and left the team in 1976 as its all-time leading scorer.

Mann signed on with the Oakland Raiders in 1976 and, in 1977, enjoyed the best season of his career. He led the NFL in scoring and became the only ex-Sioux football player to win a Super Bowl ring, as the Raiders beat Minnesota 32-14. Mann retired from football in 1979 ranked 16th on the NFL's all-time scoring list.

A native of Campbell, Minn., Errol Mann was inducted into the UND Athletic Hall of Fame in 1983, was named to UND Football's All Century team in 1994,

#77 Steve Myhra
Tackle, Linebacker, Kicker
1955-56

Known to be the only UND football player to ever grace the cover of *Life* Magazine, Steve Myhra was a consensus All-America selection as an offensive guard, linebacker and place kicker for the Fighting Sioux in 1955 and 1956.

A native of Wahpeton, N.D., Myhra led UND to wins over North Dakota State in '55 and '56 and was named the North Central Conference MVP following his senior season.

His greatest gridiron moment may have come when he kicked a field goal with just seven seconds left in regulation to send his Baltimore Colts team into overtime in the 1958 NFL championship game. The Colts went on to beat the N.Y. Giants in overtime to cap off what has been described as the best NFL game ever played. His game-tying kick was used as the cover photo of *Life* Magazine that month.

Possessed of great agility and strength, Myhra was a superb football player, widely respected by all who knew him. Following Myhra's death in 1994, his coach, Frank Zazula, said, "He was one of the greatest athletes I ever coached. He could play five or six different positions."

#41 Dave Osborn
Halfback
1963-64

The only player in University of North Dakota football history to have his uniform number retired, Cando, N.D., native Dave Osborn lettered two years for the Fighting Sioux in 1963 and 1964, when he led UND to back-to-back wins over North Dakota State. He was a first-year All-North Central Conference selection in 1964.

Osborn scored four touchdowns in the first game he started for the Sioux and in the last game he played for UND. He set the Sioux record for best single-game rushing average at 16.8 yards per carry when he ran the ball 12 times for 202 yards vs. Minnesota-Duluth on Sept. 14, 1963.

He scored 10 touchdowns in 1964 and led the Fighting Sioux to a share of the North Central Conference title before moving on to a stellar NFL career with the Minnesota Vikings.

While with the Vikings, Osborn set the franchise record with 972 rushing yards in 1967. He ranked sixth among active rushers in the NFC at the conclusion of the 1974 season.

Osborn concluded his illustrious professional career with a one-year stint with the Green Bay Packers in 1975.







Candidates for the UND Hall of Fame may not be considered for nomination until at least 10 years following his or her final participation in UND athletics.



In November of 1930, the University of North Dakota football team met with President Hoover at the White House. The Sioux finished the season 9-1 and in 2002 were inducted into the UND Hall of Fame.



It is no secret that the student-athletes at the University of North Dakota put their blood, sweat, and tears into each and every contest, but what must not go unnoticed are the long hours that are put forth in order to build a foundation for personal and professional success.

In 1987, Kurt Otto became the first student-athlete named to the CoSIDA Academic All-American team. Since then, UND has received 72 additional Academic All-American accolades, including 29 (15 first team) football student-athlete honors. In 2008, a school-record four players were added to the All-American list and another two were added in 2009.

North Dakota football players have earned 15 national postgraduate scholarships, the first awarded to Paul Franzmeier in 1982. In addition, UND has received 207 (145 NCC, 49 GWC, 13 BSC) academic all-conference nods and five nationally recognized scholar-athlete awards.

At UND, administrators, faculty, and staff provide each student-athlete the means to succeed not only athletically, but academically as well.

1970s

In 1972, **Dale Lian** became the first at UND to be awarded the NCAA Walter Byers Postgraduate Scholarship. A Byers scholar is recognized as an individual who has combined the best elements of mind and body to achieve national distinction for his or her achievements, and who promises to be a future leader in his or her chosen field.

The student-athletes are chosen in recognition of outstanding academic achievement and potential for success in postgraduate study in his or her planned career.

Charlie Bridgeford, Brian Grover, and Marvin Messner were awarded North Dakota's first North Central Conference All-Academic honors in 1974. Over the next 10 years, 18 different players were awarded for their efforts in the classroom and **Fred Slone** became UND's first three-time NCC Academic All-Conference team selection.

1980s

In 1982, **Paul Franzmeier**, a two-time NCC Academic All-Conference selection, was awarded UND's first NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. Three years later, three-time academic all-conference pick **Glen Kucera** joined Franzmeier on the prestigious list.

Kurt Otto made UND history in 1987 when he became the first Fighting Sioux to be named to the GTE Academic All-America first team, an award that is now known as the CoSIDA *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America team. A two-time academic all-conference selection, Otto also became the third UND football player to be awarded an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.

The following year, **Matt Gulseth** added to UND's academic success as he was awarded an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and was named to the CoSIDA *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America first team. He was joined on the first team by **Chuck Clairmont**, and **Rusty Ekness** received a second team nod. It was the first year that multiple players were named to the All-America list.

Through the decade UND received 33 NCC Academic All-Conference accolades, including 11 repeat selections.

1990s

In 1992, **Tim Gelinske** was a first-team academic All-American, received an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and was the school's

initial National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame National Scholar-Athlete. That same year, **Mark Ewen** was awarded UND's first Harry S. Truman Postgraduate Scholarship and was named a first-team academic All-American.

Three years later, **Tim Tibesar** pulled off Gelinske's trifecta and in addition, became the first member of the Fighting Sioux to be named a Burger King Scholar-Athlete.

Chris Schrantz was named the school's second Burger King Scholar-Athlete in 1997 in addition to twice being named to the All-NCC Academic team.

Brant Grimes capped his senior season by being named UND's third Burger King Scholar Athlete. He was also named a 1999 National Football Foundation Scholar Athlete and was chosen to the NCC All-Academic, CoSIDA Academic All-District and CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

2000

Four players (**Ryan Goven, Dan Hildebrandt, Travis O'Neel, Jed Perkerewicz** and **Scott Schultz**) were named to the NCC Academic All-Conference team. With the addition of those four, UND had already received 94 academic all-conference nods.

2001

Following an NCAA Division II national championship, the Fighting Sioux landed a UND record 12 student-athletes on the NCC Academic All-Conference list, including **Mac Schneider** who was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-American first team and was UND's second recipient of the Harry S. Truman Postgraduate Scholarship.

2002

Schneider continued on the path to academic success as he was named to the academic All-America first team and won the prestigious NCAA Walter Byers Postgraduate Scholarship. Teammate **Kelby Klosterman** became UND's fourth NFF and College Hall of Fame National Scholar-Athlete.

2003

Klosterman, a standout quarterback for the Sioux, earned the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. Klosterman, an exercise science and physical education major, was an Academic All-NCC selection as a junior and senior. In addition to Klosterman's honors, wide receiver **Jesse Ahlers** was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-America second team.

2004

Digger Anderson, Danny Gagner, Jeff Glas, Ryan Manke, Troy Newhouse, Jake Nordick and **David Wisthoff** were named academic all-conference and offensive lineman **Matt Buisker** received a summer research fellowship from the NASA North Dakota Space Grant Consortium.

2005

Seniors **Digger Anderson, Danny Gagner** and **Jeff Glas** were named to the CoSIDA *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America football team. Glas earned first team honors while Anderson and Gagner were named to the second team. UND was one of three teams to have as many as three student-athletes named to the team.

UND placed a region-high five student-athletes on the 2005 *ESPN the Magazine* Academic All-District VII College Division team, including first teamers Anderson, Gagner and Glas. Junior fullback **Trent Christensen** and junior defensive back **Michael Greenwood** earned second team honors.



UND also placed a league-high nine student-athletes on the Academic All-NCC squad and a league-high 25 student-athletes on the NCC Commissioner's Honor Roll.

Gagner was also among the seven men's student-athletes named Honor Athletes for the 2005-06 academic year by the NCC. Each conference school selected its top student-athlete on the basis of academic performance, athletic ability and performance and leadership in campus and community activities.

Additionally, freshman receiver **Brady Trenbeath** was named the 2006 recipient of the University of North Dakota's prestigious Thomas J. Clifford Freshman Award as the student who, during his freshman year, best exemplifies the highest academic standards and demonstrates leadership through participation in university and extra-curricular activities and/or community service.

2006

Senior defensive back **Michael Greenwood**, a biology major, was named the NCC Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year and was named to the CoSIDA *ESPN the Magazine* Academic All-America first team, where he was joined by teammate **Weston Dressler**. UND was the only team in Division II with two student-athletes named to the first team.

The Sioux also placed an impressive 29 student-athletes on the 2006 NCC Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll and had five representatives on the Academic All-NCC team.

2007

UND placed a nation's-best three players – senior **Weston Dressler** and juniors **Mitch Braegelmann** and **Rory Manke** – on the CoSIDA *ESPN the Magazine* Academic All-America first team. Dressler and Braegelmann earned first team honors. Dressler was also named a national semifinalist for the prestigious Draddy Trophy, the highest academic honor in NCAA football.

Additionally, UND led the NCC in academic all-conference selections (eight) and NCC Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll selections (22).

2008

A UND-record four student-athletes were named to the 2008 CoSIDA *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America football team. Seniors **Mitch Braegelmann** and **Rory Manke**, both repeat selections, were named to the first team while senior **Brady Trenbeath** and junior **Andrew Miller** were named to the second team.

In addition, Braegelmann was named one of five Laureates by Tau Beta Pi, the national engineering honor society and, along with fellow senior **Danny Freund**, was named to the 2008 Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Academic All-Star Team.

Manke was one of 29 recipients of the 2008-09 NCAA Men's Fall Sport Postgraduate Scholarship.

A league-high 16 players received Great West Conference fall all-academic honors and seven seniors gained membership into the 2009 National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame Hampshire Honor Society.

2009

Seniors **Brandon Hellevang** and **Andrew Miller** were named to the Football Championship Subdivision Athletics Directors Association Academic (FCS ADA) All-Star team. Miller went on to receive one of two FCS ADA postgraduate scholarships and was also awarded the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.

Miller's accomplishments were also recognized by the athletics department staff and coaches as he was named UND's 2009-10 Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Hellevang was also named UND's 15th CoSIDA *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-American first team member. Fellow senior **Nick Nolte** earned second team honors.

Hellevang, Miller, and Nolte were joined on the CoSIDA *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District first team by junior **Ty Boyle**. Seniors **Marcus Tibesar** and **Link Gottbeheat** were second team selections. Boyle also earned membership into UND's chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, one of the nation's oldest and most widely known academic honor societies. To close out the year, 12 players were named to the Great West Conference Fall All-Academic team and eight players were named to the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame Hampshire Honor Society.

2010

Boyle continued his success in the classroom during his final season at UND, earning a spot on the FCS ADA Academic All-Star Team as well as election into the NFF and College Hall of Fame Hampshire Honor Society. He was joined in the latter by teammates **Ryan Dressler**, **Curtis Dublanko**, **Paul German** and **Ryan Kasowski**.

Boyle, Dublanko and German also earned All-Great West academic honors and were joined in that distinction with seven other teammates.

2011

Junior **Emmett Lynch** CoSIDA *Capital One* Academic All-District honors and senior **Catlin Solum** earned a spot on the NFF and College Hall of Fame Hampshire Honor Society. Solum and Lynch were also two of 11 football players to earn GWC All-Academic honors.

2012

Senior **Brett Cameron** earned an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship for his excellence both on the field and in the classroom. Cameron was also one of four UND players to earn a spot on the NFF and College Hall of Fame Hampshire Honor Society, joining **Ross Brenneman**, **Emmett Lynch** and **Seth Wisthoff**. That quartet was also among the 14 UND players named to the Big Sky All-Academic team in the program's first season in the league.

2013

For the second straight year, North Dakota had four representatives named to the NFF and College Hall of Fame Hampshire Honor Society. That quartet was made up of offensive lineman **Jake Hoerchner**, running back **Jake Miller**, placekicker **Zeb Miller** and linebacker **Brian Otto**. Hoerchner, Otto and Zeb Miller were also among eight players named to the All-Big Sky Academic Team.

2014

The football team broke a Division I program record by having 16 players named to the All-Big Sky Academic Team. Seniors **Baylee Carr** and **Ben Henson** were among those honored and both were also named to the NFF and College Hall of Fame Hampshire Honor Society.








Verna & Loyd Amick








Dale Greenless

In 1996, Dale accepted a position with Northwest Airlines and quickly received the reputation as a computer genius for solving problems that were previously unsolvable. 



**Eugene "Gene" Murphy
Football Endowment**

If there is a story told about UND football in the 60s and 70s, chances are Eugene "Gene" Murphy is a part of it. "Murph" was a three-year letterwinner (1960, 1961, and 1962) and team captain in 1962 before starting his coaching career at UND. An assistant coach from 1963-77, he took over as head coach for Jerry Olson in 1978. His head coaching career with the Fighting Sioux only lasted two season, but he won 15 games in his short tenure. His coaching numbers do not come close to telling the whole story as coach Murphy had a huge impact on Fighting Sioux football and at Cal State Fullerton, where he continued his coaching career. "I've worked for John Robinson and Mike Holmgren. They're household names," former NFL head coach and one-time assistant for Murphy Steve Mariucci once said. "I will tell you, I learned more from Gene Murphy about coaching and how to be a head coach than both of those men put together." The Eugene "Gene" Murphy Endowment has been established by former UND players and coaches from the 1960s and 70s for football scholarships.





Dewey Sundby

Dewey Sundby Memorial Scholarship

The scholarship is awarded to a defensive lineman who has demonstrated excellence in the classroom and on the field. A native of Columbus, N.D., Dewayne "Dewey" Sundby was an assistant coach at the University of North Dakota from 1959 to 1965. Prior to his time at UND, Dewey had several head coaching experiences in Minnesota high school football, and he developed the reputation of having excellent athletic teams as well as outstanding student-athletes. During his time at UND, the Fighting Sioux compiled a 31-19-2 record and won the North Central Conference title in 1964. A certified flight instructor, Dewey left coaching in the spring of 1965 to begin a successful career as a commercial airline pilot with United Airlines. Those who played for Dewey at UND remember his devotion to the game and to the players. His spirit and enthusiasm towards athletics and positively influence on student-athletes will always be remembered. 

Todd Thomas Memorial Endowment/HOG Fund

The Todd Thomas Memorial Endowment/HOG Fund was established by the UND Foundation to honor Todd, who passed away in 2000 at the age of 40, and to keep his legacy of excellence alive. Originally set up as a memorial scholarship in 2000, the award was modified in 2003 as a way to support the priority needs of the UND offensive line (the "Hogs"). Each year's support gift is chosen by the award winner, the UND offensive linemen and offensive line coach. In support of this endowment, former Sioux lineman Jay Hilbert (1977-82) has helped form a HOG Executive Committee with more than 20 members to help in enhancing this endowment. Todd Thomas left his mark at UND as an outstanding athlete and an excellent student. Todd was an all-conference offensive tackle and graduated with cum laude honors in chemical engineering. Todd was drafted in the fifth round of the 1981 NFL draft by the Kansas City Chiefs. After playing four years in the NFL and the USFL, Todd fell back on his engineering degree. Todd eventually became the holder of seven patents and was considered a worldwide expert in under-balanced drilling techniques, which helped revolutionize underground oil and gas recovery.





Football came to UND in 1892 under the leadership of Adolph Bechdolt, professor of English and Education, who had seen the game played at Lafayette. The team played only intra-squad games.

- The first “dedicated” football field was set up in 1899 with the assistance of UND benefactor William Budge. The University Athletic Association secured the plot by paying \$150 in back taxes. Football players supplied their own uniforms. Half purchased green stockings, and the other half bought red ones. Each player wore one red and one green stocking in games.
- Harry C. (Babe) Loomis became the University’s first paid coach when he was hired at a salary of \$200 for six weeks in 1899. His football team won all six of its games, outscoring opponents by a total of 179-5.
- The success of the 1899 team on the field was just a hint of things to come. Captain and center Lynn Frazier became the first UND alumnus to be elected governor of North Dakota. Other members included William Nuessle, who became the chief justice of the North Dakota Supreme Court; William Lemke, who became North Dakota’s attorney general and then served in Congress; and Victor Wardrope, who was to be the first alumnus appointed a University trustee.
- Football at the turn of the century was a brutal affair. Passing was illegal, so the ball was advanced through the efforts of human “battering rams.” To protect the runner, offensive linemen would lock arms and attempt to mow down anyone in the way.
- Following a mediocre football season in 1907, students complained that the official colors of pink and green failed to elicit respect from UND’s opponents. Before 1917, there had been some efforts to change the University’s colors to black and gold, but influential alumni voiced their opposition. Green and white uniforms were worn in the 1920s. These became the official athletic colors in 1947.
- The Flickertail Club was organized in 1924 to raise funds for the construction of new athletic facilities. Enough was raised to begin construction in 1926. At the homecoming celebration on Oct. 8, 1927, a handsome brick stadium seating 8,000 was dedicated in honor of the University’s war dead. Before the opening of Memorial Stadium, the largest crowd ever assembled for a North Dakota football game was fewer than 1,500.
- Elmer Hanson, announcer for KFJM, made the first radio broadcast from Memorial Stadium on Oct. 29, 1927, as UND beat the North Dakota Agricultural College 13-0. The first radio broadcasts of UND athletic events were of basketball games from the UND Armory in 1926-27, also by KFJM and Elmer Hanson.
- Lights were installed at Memorial Stadium in 1929, and night games were played there until Oct. 5, 1963. The lights were removed in 1966.
- Glenn “Red” Jarrett was named in 1930 to the New York Herald-Tribune All American team at halfback, the first UND player to be so honored. The three-sport star played at UND from 1928 to 1931 and later served as coach and athletic director.
- Frederick “Fritz” Pollard, who played halfback and was named to Collier’s Little All-American First Team in 1938, won a bronze medal in the high hurdles at the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin, despite a serious leg injury.
- Cyrus Kahl, who lettered in 1928-29, was the first UND player to sign a professional football contract, with the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans in 1930 and 1931. Among several UND alumni who played professionally in the 1930s was Irv Kupcnet, who achieved national fame as a columnist and radio personality after playing for the Philadelphia Eagles.

MEMORIAL STADIUM

The 10,000-seat UND Memorial Stadium served as the home for UND football from 1927 to 2000. The stadium boasts a rich and colorful history.

UND posted a 247-88-9 record (.731) in 72 seasons at Memorial Stadium, but lost the first and last games it played there. In the first game at the stadium (Oct. 8, 1927), UND lost, 7-0, to Creighton, and in the last game there (Oct. 28, 2000), the Sioux lost, 35-23, to Augustana.

The stadium still serves as home of the North Dakota football offices and practice field along with training, weight, equipment and locker rooms. Built in 1927 as a memorial to members of the University of North Dakota community who died during World War I, the facility was one of the first examples of the Late Gothic Revival architectural design on campus. "Turrets" at the ends of the grandstands and the solid massing give it the appearance of a fortress.

In 1985, the stadium underwent renovations to install an artificial turf playing surface and an all-weather, eight-lane running track. Renovations of office space have also taken place. A new artificial turf was installed prior to the 1998 season.

The stadium has served as the home for UND athletic events, the North Dakota Boys and Girls State Track Meet and the North Dakota Special Olympics Summer Games. In the summer of 1990 and 1996, Memorial Stadium also played host to the Prairie Rose State Games.

SITTING BULL TROPHY

From 1953 to 1999, UND and the University of South Dakota competed for the Sitting Bull trophy, a carved oaken bust of the famous Sioux Indian leader, awarded after a mild dispute between the states following removal of some of the late leader's remains from a grave near Fort Yates, N.D.


The trophy was first awarded by Sodak Sports, a defunct sports weekly. UND won the trophy 28 times, compared to just 15 for USD.

NICKEL TROPHY

The Nickel Trophy, 250 times larger than a regular five-cent piece and weighing 75 pounds, was inaugurated in 1938 and was presented each fall to the winner of the North Dakota-North Dakota State football contest during the Division II series that ran through the 2003 season.

Two inches thick and 22 inches in diameter, it is an exact replica of the once-minted U.S. coin. It has been the object of many intercampus raids, recoveries and more thefts. The late Robert Kunkel, a UND alumnus and Chicago advertising executive, was the originator of the trophy. Blue Key, an honorary service fraternity on each campus, awarded the Nickel Trophy to the winning team.

UND leads in the battle for the aluminum alloy "slug" 35-30. In one stretch, the Green and White won it 12 straight times. In the all-time series against North Dakota State, UND leads 62-45-3. The Sioux retained the trophy in 2003, winning 28-21 in overtime at the Alerus Center, the most recent meeting between the two teams.



In 2001, North Dakota defeated North Dakota State 19-7 to take back the Nickel Trophy.



POTATO BOWL USA

The Potato Bowl USA is a week-long festival teaming the University of North Dakota and the Red River Valley potato growing industry. It features a Hugo's Potato Bowl Pete Hidden Medallion Contest, a Hugo's 8K run, golf tournament, the world's largest french fry feed, pep rally, service club breakfast, parade, and tailgating party football game featuring the University of North Dakota. The week's activities are arranged by the Potato Bowl Committee, a group of Greater Grand Forks volunteers.

The Potato Bowl USA was created in 1965 by then UND Athletic Director Leonard R. "Len" Marti, head football Coach Marv "Whitey" Helling, assistant football coach Jerry Olson and sports information director Lee Bohnet. The first Potato Bowl USA was played in 1966, when North Dakota shut out Idaho State 41-0 in a battle for pride among potato growing regions.

North Dakota is 38-11 in Potato Bowl USA history.





MINERAL WATER BOWL

EXCELSIOR SPRINGS, Mo. – UND forced eight Northern Illinois turnovers while committing none enroute to beating the Huskies, 37-20, in the 17th annual Mineral Water Bowl.

The Huskies gave away three fumbles and had five passes intercepted in finishing its season with a 9-1 record. UND also wound up the year with a 9-1 mark.

UND scored on its first possession on a 1-yard run by junior quarterback Corey Colehour and were never seriously threatened by the sixth-ranked Huskies.

Sioux cornerback Stan Wright got things started when he returned the opening kickoff 65 yards to the Northern Illinois 30-yard line. Four plays later Colehour punched it in and Errol Mann's extra point made it 7-0 just 3:06 into the game.

Northern Illinois successfully executed a 90-yard halfback option pass on its second play from scrimmage that went for a touchdown by Gerry Sandberg. The Huskies' extra point attempt was wide, however, and UND led 7-6.

The teams traded two more touchdowns in the first half, and UND led 21-20 at halftime.


Northern Illinois would get no closer, though, as UND recorded a safety in the third quarter and two fourth quarter touchdowns.

The Sioux ran 92 offensive plays to just 41 for Northern Illinois. Of the Huskies' 323 total yards, three were on plays of 90, 63 and 42 yards.

Starting Huskies' quarterback Ron Christian sustained a knee injury in the second quarter and missed much of the game until returning in the fourth quarter.

Sioux junior halfback Ron Bergh was named the game's outstanding back after he rushed for two touchdowns and 74 yards on 17 carries. UND sophomore Jerry Quaderer led all ballcarriers with 83 yards in 19 attempts.

NOTES: Sioux end Dave Lince was honored as the top lineman. Northern Illinois linebacker Terry Henigan was given the top tackler award ... Sioux cornerback Stan Wright had two interceptions and Colehour passed for 201 yards ... It was Northern Illinois' third trip to the Mineral Water Bowl, while the Sioux were making their first appearance in the game ... It was UND's first postseason action since 1930, when the Sioux defeated the Los Angeles Firemen, a major college all-star team, by a score of 14-9 on Christmas day on the west coast.

PECAN BOWL

ABILENE, Texas – Football-loving Texans applauded. The Fighting Sioux and all of the North Central Conference commended the University of North Dakota for its 42-24 Pecan Bowl triumph over Parsons College of Fairfield, Iowa, in the third annual Pecan Bowl.

The free-wheeling Sioux, showing their usual splendid passing game that had smashed seven foes and led to a conference title tie, simply had too many horses for the heavier Parsons outfit in this game that brought UND its first NCAA College Division Midwest football title.

There were many Sioux heroes in this wild, fan-pleasing game that produced 19 NCAA bowl records, 17 of the marks by UND coach Marv "Whitey" Helling's team as it unleashed a furious offense in windy, 30-degree weather at P.E. Shotwell Stadium in this West Texas city of 120,000.

The game was also carried into millions of Midwest homes through national television as part of the NCAA game of the week.

UND scored first. After a nine-play drive, Sioux quarterback Corey Colehour drove to the enemy 18, where a field goal attempt by Errol Mann went awry. Mann's short kick was caught by Parsons, but UND forced a fumble and Mann recovered. On the next play, Colehour threw a 13-yard pass to John Conrad with 6:36 left in the first quarter and Mann kicked the extra point for a 7-0 UND lead.

The Sioux made it 14-0 after a fake field goal attempt from the Parsons 14-yard line. UND back Pete Porinsh took the snap from center and gained 10 yards to the 4, and on the next play Porinsh ran it in.

The Sioux extended their lead on a 43-yard touchdown pass from Colehour to Jim Hester to finish off a six-play 80-yard drive.

Parsons had cut the lead to 21-10 in the third quarter, but UND capped off a 72-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown run by Porinsh with 15 seconds remaining in the third quarter.


The Sioux made it 35-10 with 6:46 left in the game on Colehour's second 43-yard TD pass of the afternoon, this time to Porinsh.

Parsons made a valiant effort to come back in the game's final minutes, narrowing the score to 35-24 with 3:10 to play, but UND put the game out of reach when Colehour hit sophomore split end Billy Predovich in the end zone with a 30-yard pass on a third-and-13 play with 51 seconds left in the game. Mann's extra point made it 42-24.

Colehour was named the game's most valuable back and UND's Roger Bonk was named the most valuable lineman.

After watching Colehour throw for 274 yards, Parsons coach Marcelino Huerta, Jr., said after the game that Colehour "was the best quarterback I've seen this year. He's a pro prospect, you can bet on that."

CAMILLIA BOWL

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – More than 17,000 fans were on hand to see North Dakota defeat Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, 38-21, in the 12th annual Camellia Bowl in a game that decided the NCAA West College Football championship.

The win was the 10th of the season for the Sioux, setting a school record. UND finished the year with a 10-1 mark, while Cal Poly finished 8-1-1.

UND shut down a Cal Poly running game that was averaging 227 yards per game, limiting the Mustangs to just 63 rushing yards on 33 attempts.

Meanwhile the Sioux ran for 266 yards on 70 attempts, led by senior Mike Deutsch's 119 yards on 41 carries.

North Dakota took a 3-0 lead 4:30 into the game on a 36-yard field goal by Jim Gronowski and made it 10-0 when Jay Gustafson connected with tight end Lawrie Skolrood on a 13-yard touchdown pass with 2:40 left in the first quarter.


UND was leading 17-0 in the second quarter when Cal Poly defensive tackle Dave Quirk intercepted a pass and returned it 60 yards for a touchdown. That made it 17-7 at halftime.

UND upped its lead to 24-7 with 2:18 to play in the third quarter on a 2-yard run by Deutsch. The touchdown capped a 17-play, 81-yard drive that took over seven minutes.

The Sioux eventually opened up a 31-7 lead before Cal Poly managed two touchdowns in the game's final four minutes.

UND was just trying to run out the clock, but freshman running back Dale Kasowski scored on a 49-yard run up the middle with just three seconds to play.

NOTES: The crowd of 17,194 was the highest of all four 1972 NCAA regional bowls ... Deutsch was named the game's most valuable offensive player and Cal Poly linebacker Gregg Lee received the game's most valuable defensive player honors – the team's respective schools received \$1,000 scholarships in the names of the two players ... The game was televised by ABC to a regional audience, with Lee Grosscup and Lynn Sanners handling the announcing chores ... The contest was seen on KTHI-TV, Ch. 11, in Grand Forks ... Game time temperature was 34 degrees.

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – Unranked Livingston (Ala.) scored three second-half touchdowns to break a 14-14 halftime tie and upset No. 1-ranked North Dakota in a first round NCAA playoff game at Memorial Stadium.

Livingston raised its record to 10-2 and advanced to the NCAA Division II semifinals in Wichita Falls, Texas, where it lost to Northern Michigan in the Pioneer Bowl. Northern Michigan went on to the Camellia Bowl in Sacramento, Calif., where it won the national championship.

The loss to Livingston was the first of the season for UND, which finished 9-1.

After Livingston took a 14-0 first quarter lead, the Sioux came back with a strong second quarter, scoring touchdowns on a seven-yard run by quarterback Brian Grover and an eight-yard run by running back Dale Kasowski.

Kasowski led all runners with 146 yards rushing on 25 carries.

The game was fairly even, statistically, but Livingston made big plays, while North Dakota was victimized by mistakes and an inability to make plays at key times.

The Sioux drove to Livingston's 10-yard line on their opening possession, but were stopped on a fourth-and-one from there.


With the score tied 14-14 in the third quarter, a pass reception by UND's Tom Petrik moved the ball to the Livingston four-yard line, but a clipping penalty negated the gain, and UND failed to score.

Livingston, which used a wishbone formation and no-huddle offense with alternating quarterbacks throughout, scored what was the eventual game-winning touchdown on an eight-yard run by quarterback Ricky Seale with 1:33 left in the third quarter.

The Tigers made it 28-14 on a 63-yard touchdown run by quarterback Willie Slater with 11:48 left in the game.

Livingston running back Alvin Edwards took a counter handoff 49 yards for a touchdown with 5:51 to finish the scoring.

NOTES: UND came into the game ranked first nationally in three polls – the UPI, AP and NCAA polls, while Livingston was unranked ... The temperature was 28 degrees at game time but was not considered a factor in the outcome, according to UND coach Jerry Olson ... There was a 10-to 15-mile per hour wind out of the northwest that grew stronger as the game went on ... The game was not televised ... Livingston linebacker Paul Davis made eight solo tackles, assisted on five others and forced two fumbles.

JACKSON, Miss. – UND took a 7-6 lead into the locker room at halftime, but Mississippi College scored 15 points in the first nine minutes of the third quarter and went on to win, 35-15, in the opening round of the NCAA Division II playoffs.

It was the second time in five years that a UND playoff appearance was spoiled by a Gulf South Conference team, with both losses coming by 20 points. In 1975, Livingston (Ala.) beat the Sioux 34-14 after the game was tied 14-14 at the half.

Mississippi College raised its record to 10-2 and advanced to the NCAA Division II semifinals, where it lost to eventual national champion Delaware.

UND finished its season with a 10-2 record.

The Choctaws led 6-0 in the second quarter, but UND went 68 yards in 12 plays, scoring on a one-yard touchdown run by Gary Pietruszewski with 6:21 to play before the half.

The Sioux received the second-half kickoff, but on UND's fourth play of the third quarter, Mississippi College recovered a Sioux fumble on the UND 36-yard line, and the Choctaws scored seven plays later on a one-yard run by Wayne Pharis to take the lead with 10:34 to play in the third. A two-point conversion made the score 14-7.


On North Dakota's next play from scrimmage, Mississippi College linebacker Ralph Ashley intercepted a pass at the Sioux 38, and the Choctaws scored on a 20-yard run by Bruce Hulitt with 6:43 left in the third.

Mississippi College extended its lead to 28-7 just 30 seconds into the fourth quarter on a five-yard run by Daryl Posey.

Pietruszewski scored his second touchdown of the game with 2:48 to play and UND's Tom Shorma ran in the two-point conversion attempt to make the score 28-15, but an on-side kick attempt by the Sioux failed.

Mississippi College's Major Everett then scored on a 41-yard run up the middle with 1:09 to play for the final score of the game.

NOTES: UND left end Joe Friederichs led all players with 17 total tackles, with four of those for lost yardage ... The game was the first-ever postseason game for Mississippi College ... UND held Choctaws tailback Calvin Howard to just 56 yards rushing; Howard came into the game as the No. 2 rusher in Division II with 1,401 yards ... The field was soaked by four inches of rain on the two days prior to the game ... Game time was 7:30 p.m. to accommodate an afternoon game between Mississippi and Mississippi State on the same field.

PITTSBURG, Kan. – Pitt State running back Ronald Moore ran for 100 yards on 29 carries and scored three touchdowns – two in the second half – to lead the No. 1-ranked Gorillas to a 26-21 comeback win over 13th-ranked North Dakota in the first round of the NCAA Division II playoffs.

It was the third consecutive playoff defeat for North Dakota, which finished the 1992 season with a 6-4-1 overall record.

It was the 23rd consecutive win for Pitt State, the defending national champion. The Gorillas raised their record to 12-0 with the win and went on to win two more playoff games before losing, 17-13, to Jacksonville State in the NCAA Division II championship game in Florence, Ala.

Moore gave the Gorillas a 6-0 lead and the extra point by Jeff Wood made it 7-0 with 9:46 to play in the first quarter after an eight-play, 48-yard drive.

UND cut the score to 7-6 with 2:06 to play in the first quarter when running back Shannon Burnell scored on a two-yard run to cap a 14-play, 60-yard drive. UND kicker Darcy Dahlem's extra-point attempt was blocked.

Pitt State scored on its next possession on a 13-yard touchdown scramble by quarterback Brian Hutchins. The extra-point snap was fumbled, and Wood did not get a kick off, making the score 13-6 with 24 seconds left in the first.

UND took the lead on Burnell's second touchdown of the day, a two-yard run with 6:32 to play in the second quarter. Sioux quarterback threw to tight end John Schumacher for the two-point conversion, making the score 14-13 in favor of UND.

That was the score at halftime, but Pitt State scored on its first drive of the third quarter after UND turned the ball over by fumbling the second half's opening kickoff.


After recovering on the UND 33-yard line, Pitt State scored on its eighth play, a one-yard run by Moore with 11:09 to play in the third. A two-point conversion pass was incomplete, making the score 19-14.

The Gorillas extended their lead early in the fourth quarter. Late in the third quarter, Pitt State's Joel Thornton intercepted a Wahl pass at the Gorillas' 31-yard line and returned it nine yards to the Pitt State 40.

After seven plays ended the third quarter, Moore finished the drive on the first play of the fourth quarter on a three-yard touchdown run. Wood's kick made it 26-14.

UND cut the lead to 26-21 with 3:34 to play in the game on a 40-yard touchdown pass from Wahl to Tim Gelinske and extra point by Dahlem.

The Sioux had one final possession, getting the ball on their own 31-yard line with 2:01 to play. Three straight Wahl completions moved the ball to the Pitt State 48-yard line, but the Sioux turned it over on possessions, and the Gorillas ran out the clock.

FIRST ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – UND's Darcy Dahlem kicked a 31-yard field goal with 6:36 to play to lift the Fighting Sioux to a 17-14 win over Pittsburg State in the first round of the NCAA Division II playoffs.

The win sent UND (9-2) into the second round of the playoffs against North Central Conference co-champion Mankato State (10-2), which defeated Missouri Southern, 34-13, in the first round. Pittsburg State ended its season with an 8-3 overall record.

The game was a rematch of the 1992 NCAA Division II playoff game that saw Pittsburg State defeat UND, 26-21, in Pittsburg, Kan.

Dahlem's kick was the 11th play in a 57-yard drive. On the winning drive, UND running back Shannon Burnell ran three times for 21 yards, but the biggest play was a 12-yard sideline pass from Sioux quarterback K.J. Coghlan to Aaron Schramm on which UND was given an additional five yards because of a Pitt State facemask penalty. That gave UND a first down on the Gorillas' 23-yard line. After the drive stalled at the PSU 13-yard line, Dahlem made his game-winning kick.

Pitt State took the ensuing kickoff and moved to the UND 28-yard line, but on second-and-nine, Sioux safety Monte Schmaltz stopped a Gorillas' option play for a four-yard loss, and on third-and-13, UND cornerback Dallas Rysavy stopped an attempted reverse for a 14-yard loss. On fourth down and 27, the Sioux stopped Pitt State quarterback Brian Hutchins to take over on downs with 1:17 to play. Five plays later UND ran out the clock to end the game.

UND tied the score 14-14 with 1:52 to play in the third quarter on a 27-yard touchdown pass from Clay Wagner to Aaron Schramm.

Pittsburg State held a 7-0 halftime lead after scoring on a 10-yard pass from Brian Hutchins to Paul Sparkman with 11 seconds to play in the first quarter.

The Sioux tied it, 7-7, with 11:05 to play in the third quarter when Wagner connected with Tom Hagert on a 41-yard TD pass.


The Gorillas took a 14-7 lead with 4:29 to play in the third quarter on a two-yard run by Hutchins.

The game took just 2:27 to play, as both teams relied heavily on their rushing prowess to keep the clock moving. UND rushed 46 times for 230 yards, while Pitt State ran 51 times for 259 yards.

The Sioux attempted just 23 passes on the afternoon, and the Gorillas threw just six times.

Burnell had 191 rushing yards on 32 carries for UND, while Pitt State's Joey Tobin had 125 rushing yards on 21 carries.



The Sioux jumped out to a 21-0 lead on Mankato State and led 41-7 after three quarters to all but clinch the victory. Both teams scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

UND started fast, scoring on its opening drive on a 29-yard screen pass from Wagner to running back Shannon Burnell.

The Mavericks, meanwhile, threw interceptions on their first two possessions, but the Sioux did not capitalize on those turnovers.

With UND leading 14-0 in the second quarter, the Mavericks fumbled the ball away on their own 33-yard line, and this time UND took advantage of the miscue, with Wagner throwing a 29-yard pass to Tom Hagert for a touchdown.

It was one of three touchdown catches on the day for Hagert, who on the afternoon totaled 156 yards on eight receptions.

After Mankato State scored on an impressive 15-play drive to make it 21-7, UND took just two plays to make it 28-7 when Wagner found Hagert in the end zone for a 40-yard touchdown pass.

A 29-yard field goal by Sioux kicker Darcy Dahlem made it 31-7 with 14:05 to play in the third quarter, and then Wagner and Hagert combined for their third touchdown, this time a 41-yarder with 7:32 to play.

Dahlem's second field goal of the day, a 32-yarder, made it 41-7 after three.

Among the game's defensive standouts were Sioux cornerbacks Brent Johnson and Dallas Rysavy. Johnson had two interceptions and eight total tackles, and Rysavy had nine total tackles and one pass breakup.

Burnell had 126 rushing yards on 24 carries. It was Burnell's third consecutive 100-yard rushing game in the playoffs.

Mavericks' quarterback Jamie Pass, a Harlon Hill Award finalist, threw for 215 yards and was also Mankato State's leading rusher, with 90 yards on 14 carries.

NOTES: UND held the ball for 34:32 to 25:28 for Mankato State.

INDIANA, Pa. – UND's 1993 playoff run came to an end on a muddy field in Indiana, Pa., as fourth-ranked IUP opened up a 21-0 lead and did not allow the Sioux to get on the scoreboard until there were just 24 seconds remaining in the game.

Like the Sioux did a week earlier against Mankato State, IUP dominated the time of possession, holding the ball for 36:46 to UND's 23:14. The Indians ran 72 offensive plays to just 52 for the Sioux.

IUP raised its record to 13-0 and advanced to the national championship game the following week in Florence, Ala., where the Indians lost to North Alabama. UND ended its season with a 10-3 record.

IUP got all the points it needed on the opening drive of the game, when running back Michael Mann, a Harlon Hill Award finalist, scored on a four-yard run to cap a 12-play drive. Mann carried seven times for 28 yards on the drive. Indians' kicker Michael Geary kicked the extra point to make it 7-0 with 9:27 to play in the quarter.

UND came right back with an impressive possession of its own, but its 17-play drive ended with no points when Sioux kicker Darcy Dahlem missed a 22-yard field goal. The drive took 8:03.


UND then forced IUP to punt, but the Sioux fumbled on the return, and the Indians capitalized on the turnover by scoring on a 10-yard pass from quarterback Scott Woods to Derrick Smith, making it 14-0 with 12:20 to play in the half.

The Sioux managed just one first down and 25 yards in their next two possessions, and IUP upped its lead to 21-0 on an eight-yard pass from Woods to Scott McClellan with 54 seconds left in the half.

The only scoring in the second half came on UND's final drive of the game. Trailing 21-0 with 3:15 to play, North Dakota moved 83 yards in nine plays, with Sioux quarterback Clay Wagner completing a 24-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Josh Ostby with 27 seconds left. Dahlem's extra point attempt was blocked.

UND attempted an onside kick, but IUP recovered and knelt down on the game's final play to run out the clock. Mann was held to just 58 yards on 17 carries, but IUP's Willie Dodson ran for a game-high 83 yards on 19 carries. Woods completed 19 of 27 passes for 171 yards.

For UND, Shannon Burnell's streak of rushing for 100 yards in three consecutive playoff games came to an end, as Burnell was limited to 48 yards on 10 carries.

FIRST ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – UND quarterback Clay Wagner threw three touchdown passes and Sioux running back Ross Almlie ran for 174 yards to lead North Dakota to an 18-6 win over Northeast Missouri in the first round of the 1994 NCAA Division II playoffs at Memorial Stadium.

The win was the seventh in a row for the Sioux and their 13th home win in their past 14 home games.

UND (9-2) advanced to play North Dakota State in the Division II quarterfinals, while Northeast Missouri finished its season with an 8-3 mark.

The Sioux opened the scoring when Wagner threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to receiver Josh Ostby with 12:11 to play in the first quarter. It was the seventh consecutive game in which Ostby caught a touchdown pass. UND kicker Juan Gomez-Tagle's extra-point attempt was blocked.

Still leading 6-0, the Sioux got on the board again early in the second quarter. UND cornerback Brent Johnson intercepted a pass by Bulldogs' quarterback Mike Vaughn at Northeast Missouri's 38-yard line and returned it 11 yards to the 27-yard line.

UND scored on its third play after the turnover when Wagner threw a 24-yard scoring pass to sophomore running back Tom Langer. It was Langer's first career touchdown. A two-point conversion pass attempt failed, and UND led 12-0 with 12:58 to play in the half.

The Bulldogs narrowed the score to 12-6 on a three-yard run by tailback Jarrett Anderson on Northeast Missouri's first drive of the second half. Kicker Scott Rudel's extra point attempt was no good.

UND regained its 12-point lead on its next drive. A short kickoff was brought back by Sioux return man James Cheatham to UND's 41, and UND moved downfield in just six plays. Langer ran up the middle for 20 yards to the Northeast Missouri 36, and then Wagner connected with junior wide receiver Jeff McElroy on a 16-yard touchdown pass with 10:39 to play in the third. Once again, a two-point conversion pass attempt failed, and the 18-6 score held up for the remainder of the game.

The Bulldogs moved into UND territory three times, but could get no closer than the Sioux 26, and each time the UND defense held.

UND noseguard Mark Callahan had 14 total tackles (five solo), including one quarterback sack, and linebacker Tim Tibesar had 11 total tackles (four solo).

Anderson, a Harlon Hill Award finalist, had 147 yards rushing on 36 carries and Northeast Missouri tight end led all receivers with six catches for 63 yards.

FIRST ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – UND opened up a 10-0 lead after the first quarter, but North Dakota State scored 41 unanswered points and went on to defeat the Sioux 41-10 in the first round of the playoffs.

UND finished its season with a 9-2 record, while NDSU raised its mark to 10-2 and went on to lose to Pitt State in the playoff quarterfinals.

For the Bison, the win avenged a 21-7 loss to the Sioux two weeks earlier at Memorial Stadium.

NDSU's offense rolled up 297 rushing yards on 55 carries and added 116 yards through the air for 413 total yards, more than double UND's 200 net offensive yards.

A pair of freshmen – quarterback Kevin Feeney and running back Reggie Scott – did most of the damage for the Bison. Feeney had 27 carries for 135 yards and completed 10 of 11 passes for 116 yards. Scott had 155 rushing yards on 27 carries and also caught four passes for 21 yards.


UND scored first after a 14-play, 62-yard drive with a 20-yard field goal by Juan Gomez-Tagle with 5:52 to play in the first quarter. UND freshman running back Phillip Moore carried nine times for 54 yards on the drive.

The Sioux then forced the Bison to punt after just three plays, and on first-and-10 from the UND 38, Sioux quarterback Kevin Klancher hit wide receiver Josh Ostby on a 53-yard pass and an NDSU personal foul put the ball on the four-yard line. Moore scored on the next play on a four-yard run up the middle, and Gomez-Tagle kicked the extra point to make it 10-0 with 3:17 remaining in the first quarter.

UND managed just 84 yards after that, however, while NDSU got four touchdown runs from Feeney and two from Scott.

The leading tackler in the game for North Dakota was left end David Hillesheim, who had 11 tackles (all solo). Sioux linebackers Tim Tibesar and Jason Mitchell each had nine tackles.

NOTES: This was UND's fourth straight season to appear in the NCAA playoffs. The game was played under sunny skies and a 35-degree temperature with a SE win blowing from 10-20 miles per hour.

FIRST ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GREELEY, Colo. – North Dakota's fifth NCAA playoff appearance of the decade started with a first-half shootout and ended in a defensive struggle.

In the end, UND did not have enough weapons as Northern Colorado came away with the first-round victory in a game that saw each team rack up more than 500 yards of total offense (UND 507, UNC 520).

North Dakota's season came to an end with the Sioux posting an 8-3 overall record. Northern Colorado, bidding for its third consecutive national title, upped its record to 11-1, but were defeated the next week in the quarterfinals by eventual national champion Northwest Missouri State.

Most of the scoring took place in the first quarter, with Northern Colorado leading 28-14 after one. The Bears got two touchdowns in the game's first 5:25, but UND cut the score to 14-7 when Sioux quarterback Sean Greenwaldt hit wide receiver Mike Juhasz on a 40-yard touchdown pass with 7:44 to play in the first quarter.

Northern Colorado scored on its third consecutive drive, though, when quarterback Corte McGuffey ran it in from 14 yards with 5:31 to play in the first.

UND was forced to punt on its next possession and Bears return man Keith Grable returned the punt 60 yards to the Sioux seven-yard line. McGuffey hit Dillan Micus for a touchdown pass on the next play and the extra point made it 28-7 with 2:47 left in the first quarter.

The Sioux then came back with an impressive drive that ended with a 31-yard touchdown pass from Greenwaldt to Phillip Moore. The extra point made the score 28-14, and that's how the quarter ended.

UNC continued its offensive onslaught in the second quarter, outscoring the Sioux 14-10 to take a 42-24 halftime lead.

In all, Northern Colorado scored touchdowns on its first five possessions and on six out of seven possessions in the first half.

The Bears added a field goal and touchdown in the second half to conclude the scoring.

Greenwaldt threw for 229 yards and three touchdowns, two to Juhasz, who caught four passes for 119 yards.

UND running back Phillip Moore rushed 25 times for 155 yards in his final game, the 25th time in his career he topped the century mark.

NOTES: UND posted a 22-3 record when Moore ran for 100 or more yards in a game.

MARYVILLE, Mo. – North Dakota's sixth NCAA playoff appearance of the 90s decade looked promising as the Fighting Sioux took a 13-0 halftime lead to the locker room.

Northwest Missouri State mounted a comeback, however, scoring 13 points in the second half and sending the game to overtime tied at 13.

UND's season ended when David Jansen scored on a 1-yard plunge and the Sioux were unable to answer.

North Dakota's season ended with a 9-2 overall record, while Northwest Missouri raised its record to 11-1 and went on to win the national title.

UND got the scoring started when cornerback Brant Grimes returned a blocked field goal 66 yards for a touchdown with 3:56 to play in the first quarter. Cameron Peterka kicked the extra point to make it 7-0 and then added two second quarter field goals to give the Sioux a 13-0 halftime lead.

The Bearcats narrowed the margin to 13-7 on a big special teams play of their own when Tony Miles scored on a 64-yard punt return with 12:34 to play in the third quarter.

UND was still leading 13-7 late in the third quarter, but Northwest Missouri put together a nine-play, 51-yard drive that ended with a 46-yard field goal by David Purnell. That made it 13-10 with 2:14 to play in the third quarter.

The Bearcats tied it with 10:19 to play in the game on another field goal by Purnell, this time from 36 yards out.


Neither team managed any solid scoring chances the remainder of regulation time, and that sent the game to overtime, marking the first time UND was involved in a playoff game that went to overtime.

The Bearcats got the ball first, starting at the UND 25-yard line per NCAA rules. Faced with a third down and 11 to go, the Bearcats called a timeout. After conferring on the sidelines, quarterback Travis Miles hit Tony Miles on a 10-yard pass and on fourth and one, Tucker Woolsey ran for two yards and a first down on the UND 14-yard line.

Jansen then rushed for 11 yards to the three-yard line and on third and goal from the one, Jansen ran it in, and Purnell's extra point made it 20-13.

UND got the ball next, but on a fourth and eight play from the Northwest Missouri State 23-yard line, Sioux quarterback Tony Stein's pass to Mike Juhasz was incomplete, ending UND's season.

NOTES: UND sophomore Jed Perkerewicz ran for 141 yards on 30 carries, and Jansen ran for 115 yards on 24 carries for Northwest Missouri State.

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – UND quarterback Kelby Klosterman tied an NCAA Division II playoff record by throwing six touchdown passes—four to Sioux wide receiver Jesse Smith—to lead North Dakota to a 42-28 win over Winona State in the first round of the NCAA Division II Football Championship playoffs.

The Sioux (11-1) advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals and will play host to Pittsburg (Kan.) State (11-1). Winona State finished its season with a 10-2 record.

Klosterman's six TD passes tied the NCAA Division II single-game playoff record set by Portland State's Darren DeLandrae in a three-overtime game in 1989 and equaled by UC Davis's J.T. O'Sullivan in 2000.

Smith, who caught six passes for 133 yards, tied an NCAA Division II single-game playoff record with his four touchdown receptions. That mark has been achieved three times previously. It was first reached by Lehigh's Steve Kreider in 1977, and later accomplished by West Chester's Scott Asman in a three-overtime game in 1989 and West Chester's Brian Penacale in 1994.

UND took the opening kickoff and drove for a touchdown with a 12-play, 77-yard drive. The drive was capped by a 10-yard Klosterman touchdown pass to tight end John Kyvig. Klosterman then threw a 2-yard TD pass to Kyvig that made it 14-0 with 3:22 to play in the quarter.


Winona State scored its first touchdown on a one-yard run by quarterback Bruce Carpenter, but a 19-yard touchdown pass from Klosterman to Smith upped UND's lead to 21-7 with 3:26 to play in the half.

Winona State responded with a nine-play, 74-yard drive capped by a five-yard touchdown pass from Carpenter to Adam Lilla with 21 seconds to play in the half, making it 21-14 at halftime.

UND extended its lead to 28-14 with 5:35 to play in the third when Klosterman threw a 16-yard touchdown to Smith, but the Warriors narrowed the score to 28-21 when Carpenter hit Lilla on a 64-yard touchdown pass with 4:17 left in the third.

Less than two minutes later, Klosterman threw a 39-yard touchdown pass to Smith with 2:49 to play in the quarter, making it 35-21, and the duo connected one more time to conclude UND's scoring. Winona State closed the scoring on a 2-yard touchdown pass from Carpenter to Lilla with 26 seconds to play.

NOTES: UND gained a season-high 508 yards of total offense in the game ... Winona State linebacker Jake Tietje led all players with 13 tackles (12 solo). UND's Eric Schmidt had seven solo tackles and five pass breakups ... UND's 42 points was the highest total ever recorded by the Sioux in 16 playoff games ... Perkerewicz's 100-yard game was the 12th of his career (second in the playoffs) ... Klosterman's 27 completions was a career high ... Klosterman's six touchdown passes is a UND playoff record and matched the Sioux regular season single-game mark that was set by Corey Colehour in 1966 ... Kyvig's two-touchdown game was the first of his career.

QUARTERFINALS, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – The UND defense held Pittsburg (Kan.) State to –19 rushing yards and 134 yards of total offense and defeated the Gorillas, 38-0, to advance to the NCAA semifinals against UC Davis.

It will be the third NCAA semifinal appearance for North Dakota (12-1), which also made it to the semifinals in 1993 and 1994.

Pittsburg State finished its season 11-2 overall after being shut out for the first time in 217 games dating back to Nov. 6, 1982, when the Gorillas lost, 13-0, at Nebraska-Kearney. It was Pitt State's worst loss since Sept. 14, 1984, when the Gorillas lost, 62-14, at Missouri-Rolla.

It was UND's first shutout of the season and first-ever postseason shutout in 17 postseason games, and it was the largest-ever margin of victory for the Sioux in the postseason, surpassing UND's 33-point win over MSU, Mankato in 1993.

UND got its first score with 21 seconds to play in the first quarter when Kelby Klosterman connected with wide receiver Dan Graf on a 16-yard fade pass in the end zone to cap off a seven-play, 85-yard drive.

The Sioux extended their lead to 13-0 with 6:44 to play in the half on a 47-yard touchdown pass from Klosterman to wide receiver Jesse Smith on a deep post route.

UND's next touchdown came on one of the most memorable plays of the season. Facing a 1st-and-15 from the UND 38-yard line, Klosterman found tight end Chad Mustard open on a sideline pass designed to gain about 15 yards. Mustard, however, broke several tackles while managing to stay in bounds, and he took it all the way to the end zone for a 62-yard touchdown play with 1:56 to play in the half.


Moments later, UND had a 4th-and-5 at Pitt State's 42-yard line. North Dakota Head Coach Dale Lennon sent kicker Cameron Peterka in for a field goal attempt, and with 28 seconds to play in the half Peterka made a 59-yard field goal that is an NCAA playoff record for any division (I-AA, II or III). It was Peterka's 11th career field goal of 50 or more yards and seventh in 2001.

The previous long field goal in an NCAA Division II playoff game was 50 yards by Troy State's Ted Clem against North Dakota State on Dec. 8, 1984. The previous long field goal in any playoff game was 56 yards by Nevada's Tony Zendejas against Idaho State on Nov. 26, 1983. The field goal tied Peterka's career long, as he also kicked a 59-yarder at St. Cloud State on Nov. 4, 2000.

In the third quarter, UND extended its lead to 26-0 on a 25-yard field goal by Peterka with 8:55 to play. Later in the third quarter, a snap on a punt attempt went over Lutz's head into the end zone, and Lutz recovered but ran out of the end zone for a safety that made it 28-0 with 58 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

Peterka kicked a 33-yard field goal with 14:49 to play in the fourth quarter and UND running back Aaron Schwenzfeier closed out the scoring with a four-yard run with 8:13 to play.

Defensively, UND was led by inside

SEMIFINALS, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – UND quarterback Kelby Klosterman threw two touchdown passes to Dan Graf, and Sioux running back Jed Perkerewicz rushed for 101 yards on 20 carries to lead North Dakota to a 14-2 win over UC Davis in the NCAA semifinals.

Perkerewicz's 100-yard game was his second of this year's playoffs, and third 100-yard rushing game in four career playoff games.

The win earned UND (13-1) a berth in the NCAA Division II national championship against Grand Valley (Mich.) State (13-0). Grand Valley State advanced to the title game by beating Catawba 34-16. UC Davis finished its season with a 10-3 record.

The keys for UND in beating UC Davis were a ball-control offense, a defense that came up with big plays at crucial times and a vocal hometown crowd of 11,696. UC Davis was penalized 12 times for 84 yards, including seven illegal procedure penalties.

The only score of the first half came when Klosterman found Graf open on a 25-yard touchdown pass with 3:39 to play in the second quarter. The Klosterman-Graf duo connected again on a 12-yard scoring pass with 10:26 to play in the third quarter to make it 14-0, UND.

UC Davis got its only points on a safety with 30 seconds to play in the game. The Sioux were facing 4th-and-12 from their own 3-yard line, and UND head coach Dale Lennon decided to have Klosterman down the ball in the end zone, conceding two points to the Aggies. After the free kick, UC Davis drove to the Sioux 30-yard line, but UND defensive end Eric Halverson sacked UC Davis quarterback J.T. O'Sullivan to end the game.


Although the Aggies had more total offense (376 yards) than the Sioux (308 yards)—UC Davis was the first team to outgain UND in total offense in a game this season—North Dakota controlled the clock for 31:59, while UC Davis was on offense for 28:01.

UC Davis showed why it had the nation's fourth-ranked offense in the regular season. The Aggies gained 376 total yards (327 passing, 49 rushing) against the Sioux defense, which finished the regular season ranked third nationally in total defense. It was the most yardage gained all season against UND, surpassing the previous opponent high of 339 by Winona State on Nov. 17 in the first round of the playoffs.

UC Davis advanced past midfield seven times in 11 offensive possessions, and got to UND's 10-yard line or closer on four possessions. On each occasion, however, the Sioux defense came up with a big play.

In the first half, on a 3rd-and-goal from the UND 7, O'Sullivan's pass was intercepted by UND cornerback Dustin Thornburg in the end zone. It was one of two interceptions by Thornburg, who also broke up two other passes. At the end of the half, UC Davis advanced to the UND 10-yard line, but missed a field goal attempt from there.

UC Davis's best scoring chance of the second half came on its opening drive of the fourth

quarter. The Aggies advanced to the Sioux 3-yard line, but were stopped four times from there, allowing UND to take over on downs with 10:35 to play in the game. Late in the game, UC Davis reached the Sioux 5-yard line but O'Sullivan's pass on 4th-and-2 from there fell incomplete with 1:54 remaining.

Defensively, UND cornerback Craig Riendeau had a game-high 10 tackles (nine solo), while linebacker Eric Schmidt had eight tackles (seven solo).

FLORENCE, Ala. – UND running back Jed Perkerewicz's one-yard touchdown run with 29 seconds remaining lifted North Dakota a 17-14 win over Grand Valley (Mich.) State in the NCAA Division II title game, giving UND its first-ever national championship in 105 years of football.

Perkerewicz's winning touchdown run capped a nine-play, 80-yard drive during which UND converted two fourth downs. The biggest of those was a 58-yard pass from Kelby Klosterman to Luke Schleusner on 4th-and-4 from the UND 41-yard line.

On the play Schleusner ran what UND coaches call a "stick route," running six yards downfield before cutting to the middle of the field. The play was designed to simply get enough yards for the first down, but Schleusner broke a tackle, got a key downfield block from Jesse Smith and cut to the far sideline before being brought down by the Lakers' Dustin Cole at the one-yard line.

Perkerewicz scored on the next play to give UND the lead.

The Sioux's game-winning drive began from UND's 20-yard line after Grand Valley State had taken a 14-10 lead with 2:46 to play on a 12-yard touchdown run by quarterback Ryan Brady.

Klosterman's first two passes were incomplete, and then he scrambled for eight yards, making it 4th-and-2 at the UND 28-yard line. Klosterman converted the fourth down with a quarterback sweep around left end for seven yards. Next was a six-yard pass to Perkerewicz to make it 2nd-and-4 at UND's 41.

Klosterman threw an incompletion on second down, and on third down was nearly sacked but got back to the line of scrimmage, setting up the fourth-down pass to Schleusner.

Grand Valley State led 7-3 after one quarter and the second and third quarters were scoreless. UND held off the Lakers on one third quarter drive when Sioux cornerback Craig Riendeau blocked a 20-yard Kevin Sonntag field goal attempt with 8:50 to play in the third quarter.

UND grabbed a 10-7 lead early in the fourth quarter when Klosterman scored on a nine-yard bootleg run around the left side after a fake handoff and fake reverse.

Grand Valley regained the lead, 14-10, on Brady's run with 2:46 to play.

The game was played in 63-degree temperatures, light rain and southwest wind blowing at 9 miles per hour.

UND won the coin toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff. The Sioux capitalized on their game-opening drive with a 36-yard field goal by Cameron Peterka. The field goal capped a 10-play, 56-yard drive highlighted by a 27-yard pass from Klosterman to Graf on UND's second play from scrimmage.

The Sioux forced Grand Valley State to punt on its first possession, and had a chance to extend its lead, but Peterka was wide left on a 47-yard field goal attempt.

The Lakers followed that with a 10-play, 70-yard drive that concluded with a two-yard touchdown run by Grand Valley State quarterback Ryan Brady. It was only the fourth rushing touchdown allowed by UND all season.

The Sioux were forced to punt on their next possession, but got the ball back when UND strong safety Mike O'Neil intercepted a Todd Wojciechowski pass and returned it to the Grand Valley State 33-yard line. UND advanced to the Lakers' 10-yard line, but on fourth down Peterka's 38-yard field goal came up short.

The UND defense came up with another big play in the second quarter when O'Neil intercepted a Wojciechowski pass at the Sioux 12-yard line and returned it 44 yards to the UND 49-yard line. The Sioux moved to the 11-yard line, but the Grand Valley State defense stiffened, and Peterka's 36-yard field goal was wide left.


Grand Valley State outgained UND 169-157 in the first half, but the Sioux had an edge in time of possession, controlling the ball for 17:50, while the Lakers had it for 12:10.

For the game, UND had a 326 to 299 edge in total yards and held the ball for 35:22 to 24:38 for Grand Valley State. The Sioux gained 187 yards rushing and 139 passing.

Perkerewicz had 96 yards on 26 carries for North Dakota, while Klosterman rushed 18 times for 61 yards. Klosterman completed eight of 27 passes for 139 yards. Schleusner caught three passes for 76 yards and Graf caught three balls for 41 yards.

Grand Valley State's Ryan Brady had 83 yards rushing and two touchdowns on 15 carries, while the Lakers' Reggie Spearman had 52 yards on seven carries. Todd Wojciechowski completed 11 of 22 passes for 128 yards and two interceptions.

Riendeau, linebacker Josh Kotelnicki and defensive end Ben Dixon each had six tackles for UND.

"THE DRIVE"

Prospects hardly could have been dimmer for the University of North Dakota football team.

The lights at Braly Municipal Stadium had been on since before noon, the rain varied between a mist and a drizzle, and the Sioux were on their own 20-yard line with 2 minutes 42 seconds to go. Grand Valley State University of Michigan had just scored a touchdown to take a 14-10 lead.

The national championship of Division II football in the National Collegiate Athletic Association seemed beyond UND's grasp. The Sioux offense was not noted for the quick strike. Rather, it was grind it out and hang your hat on the defense.

As the sand in the hourglass trickled through, ever filling the lower portion, UND tried to put together a drive.

It was not easy, and it was not pretty.

From the 20 after a touchback on the kickoff, UND quarterback Kelby Klosterman threw two passes that fell incomplete, one intended for wide receiver Dan Graf, the other for wide receiver Jesse Smith. On third and 10, Klosterman could not find a receiver, so he ran for eight yards. Timeout: 2 minutes 10 seconds left. Fourth and two.

Chris Mussman, the UND offensive coordinator, up in the press box, called Klosterman's number again. Seven yards around left end. First down on the 35. Clock stopped momentarily (first down).

Next, Klosterman passed to tailback Jed Perkerewicz for six yards, then threw incomplete to wide receiver Luke Schleusner, stopping the clock. Again, Klosterman found his receivers covered, and he ran for no gain. Timeout: 1 minute to go. Sioux still in Dakota Territory, on own 41, fourth and four.

In the press box, Mike Mannausau, graduate assistant working with the defensive line, implored Mussman to call the "stick route" pass play, part of the West Coast Offense. With earphones on, Mussman did not hear the advice, but called "stick route" anyway.


"We hadn't used the play for two weeks," Mussman recalled later. "We hadn't even run it in practice."

With Grand Valley sending everyone but the kitchen sink on a blitz to pressure the quarterback, Klosterman received excellent protection from his five down linemen and Perkerewicz and had time to pass to Schleusner over the middle.

The play was designed to gain five yards, enough for the first down, but Schleusner broke free from a tackle and headed outside, toward the right sideline. Smith, with a broken nose suffered earlier in the game, crossed toward the middle and leveled a Grand Valley defender with a textbook open-field block.

"All I could see was grass," Schleusner recalled. "I'm not the fastest guy in the world, but I ran as fast as I could. When I got near the 10, it felt like I was carrying a plow, and someone caught me a yard short of the goal." With the first down, the clock stopped with 36 seconds remaining.

As UND lined up for the next play, it started again, but the Sioux took immediate charge. Perkerewicz followed his blockers over left tackle, and when Grand Valley's defenders packed the middle, Perkerewicz bounced to the outside and scored untouched.

Cameron Peterka kicked the extra point, and UND led, 17-14, with 29 seconds to go.

The suspense was not over. Brent Lesniak of Grand Valley returned Peterka's kickoff into UND territory. Peterka met him with a crushing tackle, but it did not matter, because Grand Valley was called for an illegal block and set back to its 20.

The Lakers could proceed no farther, and on the last play, Sioux linebacker Eric Schmidt barely missed sacking the quarterback, then got back on his feet and tackled the receiver at the Grand Valley 34.

All the scoring occurred in the first and last quarters. Peterka opened with a 36-yard field goal.

The teams then traded quarterback rushes for scores. Ryan Brady went two yards for Grand Valley, then Klosterman nine yards for UND and Brady again for 12 yards.

On the play before Brady's second touchdown to put Grand Valley ahead with 2 minutes 46 seconds left, UND cornerback Dustin Thornburg stripped the ball from receiver David Kircus, but Kircus recovered his own fumble on the UND 12-yard line.

"They scored on the next play, so that was a big swing for them," Sioux Coach Dale Lennon said later. "That put our backs to the wall, but we came through. It was a team victory — offense, defense, special teams. We're all a part of it.

"And we went about our business very calmly, very professionally. There was no panic, no chaos."

The late Chuck Johnson was the editor of Sioux Sports, a quarterly publication of the UND Alumni office, Letterwinner's Club, and athletic department. A 1948 UND graduate from Williston, N.D., Johnson was a longtime sports editor at the Milwaukee Journal.

FIRST ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – Behind an opportunistic defense which took the ball away seven times, the Fighting Sioux beat Pittsburg State, 24-14, in the opening round of the NCAA Division II playoffs. Sophomore defensive back Josh Brandsted had an interception and a 14-yard fumble return for a touchdown that gave UND a lead that it would not relinquish.

Adam Roland got the Sioux on the board first after a 10-yard rush down to the one-inch line, where he would punch it in one play later, putting UND up, 7-0. That's where the score would stay heading into halftime as four PSU drives would be snuffed out by turnovers in the first half, three by interceptions. At the break, Gorilla quarterback Neal Philpot was 2-for-15 with three interceptions.

On their first possession of the second half, the Gorillas would mount their most successful drive, going 80 yards in ten plays, keeping the ball for just over five minutes. The drive would be capped by Philpot's one-yard run to knot the score at 7-7.

The Sioux had a long drive of its own on the ensuing possession, but came up short as Jeff Glas' field goal attempt from 36 yards was wide left. Two plays later, Brandsted scooped up a Philpot fumble and raced 14 yards for a score and a 14-7 UND lead.

Philpot would fumble again on the next Gorilla drive, leading to a 37-yard field goal by Glas to put UND up 17-7. Philpot, an All-MIAA quarterback, was not the force that led the Gorillas all season as he netted just 269 yards of total offense with four interceptions and one lost fumble.

Philpot did, however, lead the Gorillas on another 80-yard drive ending in a 9-yard strike to Tim Austin to close the gap to 17-14.


But the Sioux backfield keyed a 78-yard drive on the next possession, ending in a 11-yard touchdown pass from Joe Wilson to Dan Grossman to put UND back up by ten, 24-14.

Pittsburg State would use completions of 12, 11 and 21 yards to get back in Sioux territory but a fumble by Austin thwarted that opportunity as the Sioux took over at their own 30-yardline. PSU was able to force a three-and-out on the Sioux drive, giving one last opportunity for the Gorillas to inch closer.

Danny Gagner intercepted Philpot in the end zone with under a minute on the clock to closeout the game. The Sioux defense had easily its best day in terms of takeaways, jumping on three fumbles and picking off four passes. The previous high for takeaways in a game this season was three (two INTs, one fumble recovery) in the season opener against Minnesota-Crookston.

Roland finished the game with the second-best effort of his career, logging 164 net yards rushing on 31 carries. He had a 166-yard game against Augustana earlier this season. Willis Stattelmann led the Sioux receivers with six catches for 57 yards.

The Sioux will face Winona State in the NCAA Division II quarterfinals on Sat., Nov. 29 at 1:00 p.m. at the Alerus Center.

QUARTERFINALS, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – Caleb Johnson's 69 yard reception with just over a minute left set up Adam Roland's one-yard touchdown plunge as top-seeded North Dakota erased a late fourth quarter deficit to down visiting Winona State 36-29 in the NCAA Division II quarterfinal round Saturday at Alerus Center.

Johnson, who had a nine-yard touchdown catch early in the second quarter, pulled in a 15-yard slant from John Bowenkamp and raced down the sidelines to the Warriors' five. Three plays later Roland gave UND the lead with 24 seconds left with his second touchdown of the day.

The Sioux clinched the second round triumph when Jason Peterson recovered a Brian Wrobel fumble at the UND 45-yard line as time expired. It was the fifth turnover UND's defense forced in Saturday's contest and possibly the biggest.

The furious last minute rally moves the Fighting Sioux (11-1) into the Division II semifinals, where they will meet North Alabama next Saturday. Times and site will be determined later this week.


After taking a 28-7 into the half, UND watched Winona State put together a second half rally to take a one-point lead with 1:52 remaining in the fourth quarter. Warrior tailback Bounthavy Khamratthanome hit Chris Samp with a 19-yard touchdown on a halfback pass play to give the Warriors their first lead of the game.

Winona State outgained the Sioux 406-365, but fell victim to five turnovers – three fumbles and two interceptions – and a slow start.

The Fighting Sioux scored on four consecutive possessions in the second quarter, including a 73-yard punt return for a touchdown by Travis Lueck, to build a 21-point lead before the half. It was the most points the Sioux have scored in a quarter this year since dropping 42 on Minnesota-Crookston in the second quarter of the season's opening game.

Johnson and Willis Stattleman caught touchdowns of nine and 19 yards, respectively from Joe Wilson in the 28-point period.

The Sioux will host South Region champion North Alabama next Saturday in the NCAA Division II Semifinals. Kickoff is slated for 1 p.m. at the Alerus Center.

SEMIFINALS, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – Adam Roland rushed for 107 yards, while quarterback John Bowenkamp threw three touchdown passes as the University of North Dakota advanced to its second Division II title game in three years with a 29-22 triumph over North Alabama Saturday at the Alerus Center.

The Fighting Sioux (12-1) will meet last year's national champion, Grand Valley State, in a rematch of the 2001 championship game in Florence, Ala. next Saturday.

There was no fourth quarter rally this week. Instead senior wide receiver/kick returner Travis Lueck made sure Saturday's semifinal game would start with a bang.

Lueck returned a punt for 48 yards and then caught a 30-yard touchdown on UND's first offensive play from scrimmage to give the Sioux an early 6-0 lead. It was the East Grand Forks native's eighth touchdown reception of the year, tying him for the team lead with Willis Stattleman.

Another long punt return by Lueck helped set up a 27-yard field goal by Jeff Glas to put the Sioux up 9-0 midway through the first quarter.


Following a Lions' field goal, Bowenkamp threw his second touchdown pass of the day on a five-yard pattern to David Wisthoff as the Sioux built a 19-3 edge heading into the fourth quarter.

The defense held North Alabama to just eight yards rushing, the Lion's worst total this season, and intercepted Harlon Hill candidate Will Hall twice in the second half.

Ryan Manke's fourth quarter pick helped the Sioux put the game away early in the final period.

The junior corner back's interception set up Bowenkamp's third TD of the game, a 15-yarder to Matt Vanderpan on a fake field goal play with 7:49 remaining. It was the senior tight end's second catch of the season and the second touchdown of his career.

Bowenkamp has now thrown three touchdowns or more six times in his career.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

Despite outgaining Grand Valley State by 125 yards in the second half, North Dakota fell to the Lakers 10-3 Saturday in the Division II national championship game.

Quarterback John Bowenkamp led the Sioux on two 60 yard drives late in the game, but UND could only come away with three points on a 43-yard Jeff Glas field goal. The junior quarterback completed 28-of-41 passes for 281 yards, while receivers Willis Stattleman and Caleb Johnson collected eight and seven catches respectively.

There was no last second victory for the Sioux this week as Bowenkamp was intercepted by Mike Hoad deep in Laker territory to seal the win. Prior to the pick, UND had driven 58 yards on 12 plays in search of the tying score.


The game was a battle of the defenses as the teams mustered just a combined 257 total yards and three total points in the first half. Grand Valley got on the board first with a 7:28 drive on the game's opening possession, driving to the one-yard line, capped by David Hendrix's 19-yard field goal. UND followed with a three-and-out possession, but were able to get the ball back two plays later as Tyler Dahlen scooped up a Mario Locricchi fumble giving UND good field position. A 3rd-and-19 conversion on that drive would advance the ball to the Laker 37, but the drive stalled as Jeff Glas' 47-yard field goal try missed wide left.

The teams traded punts before UND snuffed-out consecutive fourth-down tries by GVSU to end two scoring threats late in the first half. The Sioux mustered just 60 yards of total offense in the opening half, including minus-two yards on the ground. Grand Valley held over a nine-minute advantage in time of possession in the first half and had 14 first downs to UND's two.

UND had its most impressive drive to open the second half, marching effectively until a fumbled snap turned into a 59-yard fumble return by Lucious Harris to set up Grand Valley State's only touchdown.

Johnson led all receivers with 101 yards through the air. Adam Roland finished with 43 yards on the ground and Willis Stattleman picked up 57 receiving yards to put both over the 1,000-yard mark on the season. It marks the first time that UND has had a 1,000-yard rusher and receiver in the same season.

Truly one of the most memorable seasons of UND football, the team will gather one last time for a celebration at the Alerus Center on Tuesday at 6 p.m. Head coach Dale Lennon and select players will speak and will feature a highlight video of the team's success.

FIRST ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D. — University of North Dakota junior place kicker Jeff Glas booted a 32-yard field goal in the second overtime to give UND a 20-17 win over St. Cloud State University in a first round game of the NCAA Division II football playoffs Saturday afternoon at Husky Stadium.

St. Cloud State fought back in the fourth quarter to overcome a 10-0 UND lead. North Dakota, ranked 14th this week, took their opening drive of the first quarter 70 yards in 14 plays culminating with a one-yard Adam Roland run at 6:37. UND led at the half 7-0.

On North Dakota's second drive of the second half, Jeff Glas kicked a 38-yard field goal to put UND ahead 10-0 with 6:16 left in the third quarter.

The fourth quarter belonged to the Huskies. After getting good field position following a North Dakota punt, the Huskies took the ball 48 yards on nine plays to get SCSU on the board. Junior quarterback Dan Kaczor found the open man in the end zone junior receiver Ryan Koch with a seven-yard pass and UND led 10-7. On the ensuing kick-off the Huskies downed the ball on the UND 16.

After several big SCSU defensive plays, SCSU sophomore safety Mitch Denne intercepted the ball and SCSU took over on the 33. Seven plays later, SCSU junior Shawn Braunagel tied the game with a 36-yard field goal at 10:45.


Glas missed a 52 yard field goal at 6:18. St. Cloud started to drive the ball but a fumble by junior running back Matt Birkel returned the ball to UND with 4:28 left. SCSU and UND exchanged punts on the next four drives and UND took over on the SCSU 49 with :38 seconds left in the game.

UND drove the ball to the Husky 21-yard line and with 11 seconds left in the game set up for a 38-yard field goal attempt. After three SCSU timeouts, Glas attempted his fourth field goal of the day and missed wide left and the game went to overtime.

North Dakota got the ball in the first possession of the overtime and senior tailback Adam Roland scored on a three-yard run and UND led 17-10. On St. Cloud State's possession, Kaczor found Ryan Koch on a 14-yard pass play sending the game into the second overtime at 17-17.

St. Cloud State had the first possession of the second overtime and the UND defense held as Matt Birkel was dropped for a five yard loss, followed by an incomplete pass, and a Kaczor six-yard run to the UND 24. SCSU kicker Shawn Braunagel's 41 yard field goal attempt missed wide left.

On North Dakota's possession, sophomore quarterback Chris Belmore completed a seven yard pass to David Wisthoff to the SCSU 16. UND set up once again for a field goal and this time, after only one SCSU timeout, Glas kicked a 32-yard field goal and UND won 20-17 in double overtime.

SECOND ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

HOUGHTON, Mich. — Senior quarterback John Bowenkamp came off the bench and threw two touchdown passes – including one on a fake field goal – to lead UND to a 20-3 victory over Michigan Tech in the second round of the NCAA playoffs this afternoon at Sherman Field.

Bowenkamp, who has missed much of the season due to injury, relieves starter Chris Belmore in the second quarter and engineered a touchdown drive on just his second series.

After a 30-yard punt return by Weston Dressler gave UND the ball inside Husky territory, Bowenkamp led the Sioux 32 yards in just four plays, finding receiver Dan Grossman on a 19-yard strike. Grossman's TD came on play after he had dropped what appeared to be a sure touchdown pass. The toss was also Bowenkamp's first passing TD since the season opener against Delta State.

That scoring drive gave UND a 10-0 halftime lead and all of the offense the Sioux would need on this day.

Michigan Tech would open the second half with its most impressive drive. Featuring a heavy dose of running back and Harlon Hill finalist Lee Marana, the Huskies chewed up five and a half minutes of clock, but the drive stalled at UND's 16-yard line when Brook Maier sacked MTU quarterback Chad Alger. Grant Botz booted a 33-yard field goal, but it would prove to be the only points for MTU against the nation's top scoring defense.

UND's defense stiffened after that initial drive. Jason Hoffschneider picked off Alger on MTU's next series and the Sioux forced another turnover to start the fourth quarter when the Huskies failed to convert on a fourth down gamble on their own 40.


UND forced a third straight turnover when MTU punter Billy Koenig couldn't handle a high snap and Dan Ullsperger recovered for UND at the Husky 34. But despite taking over inside MTU's half of the field on those three consecutive possessions, the UND offense was unable to put any points on the board.

That is until kicker Jeff Glas lined up to kick what appeared to be a 35-yard field goal attempt. In a play eerily reminiscent to last year's NCAA semifinal against North Alabama, holder Bowenkamp faked and threw a touchdown pass to a tight end. Last year it was Matt Vanderpan, this year it was Will Kusler with 3:53 remaining.

Bowenkamp, making just his third appearance at quarterback this season, was 12-of-19 for 123 yards and the two scores. He replaced Belmore, who had completed 6-of-8 passes for 80 yards and a three-yard touchdown toss to tight end Trevor Mielke.

MTU quarterback Chad Alger was not nearly as efficient. The freshman, an injury replacement for GLIAC Player of the Year Dan Mettlich, was picked off four times and sacked five times. Hoffschneider had two of the interceptions and Ryan Manke and Danny Gagner had one each.

UND's Caleb Johnson led all receivers with nine catches for 99 yards. Brandon Strouth (18

GRAND FORKS, N.D. — Chris Belmore's two-yard run with just under five minutes remaining powered the University of North Dakota past Grand Valley State, 19-15 in the NCAA Division II quarterfinals Saturday afternoon at Alerus Center.

Belmore, who entered the game in the third quarter in place of John Bowenkamp, led the Fighting Sioux on two touchdown drives in the fourth quarter as UND overcame a 15-6 deficit in the final 11:29.

After Brandon Langston gave the Lakers a nine-point lead with a 76-yard touchdown reception, Belmore led the Sioux on a four-play, 68-yard touchdown drive to bring the Sioux to within 15-12.

Sophomore tailback Brandon Strouth capped the quick drive with a 24-yard run. The 5-foot-8 back finished the day with 64 yards on nine carries.

The teams traded possessions before UND's Dan Ullsperger sacked GVSU quarterback Cullen Finnerty forcing a fumble on third down. Sophomore defensive tackle Adm Wolff recovered at the Lakers' 29.


Four plays later, Belmore trotted into the end zone with the winning score on a bootleg to the right side. It was the quarterback's second rushing touchdown of the season.

The Sioux defense forced a punt on the Lakers' ensuing possession and clinched the game when Belmore hit senior wide out Caleb Johnson on a third down-and-eight with 52 seconds to go. Johnson led UND's receiving corps with nine catches for 96 yards, while Belmore completed nine of 18 passes for 89 yards in the second half.

UND (11-2), which fell to Grand Valley State in the 2003 Division II national championship game, becomes the first team to beat the Lakers in the postseason since it defeated GVSU in the 2001 national championship game.

The Lakers (10-3) were looking for their third consecutive NCAA title.

The Fighting Sioux will take on Pittsburg State (Kan.) in the Division II semifinals on Dec. 4 likely in Pittsburg, Kan. The NCAA will make a formal announcement by Sunday afternoon.

PITTSBURG, Kan. — Top-ranked Pittsburg State scored 17 unanswered points in the second half to break open a 14-13 game and secure a 31-19 victory over 14th-ranked University of North Dakota before a sellout crowd of 9,983 fans at Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium Saturday in the NCAA Division II national semifinals.

The Gorillas (14-0) advance to the 2004 NCAA Division II National Championship game in Florence, Ala., on Dec. 11 to meet third-ranked Valdosta State University. Pitt State returns to the championship game for the first time since 1995 and the fourth time in school history (1991-92-'95).

Senior quarterback Neal Philpot rushed for 122 yards and tossed three touchdown passes in the game, including a 12-yard scoring pass to junior tight end Brandon Twito that essentially sealed the win with 2:31 to play in the game.

Philpot's clinching pass came on 4th-and-2 at the UND 12 and the Gorillas leading 24-13. The play capped a nine-play, 63-yard drive that consumed five minutes and seven seconds of precious time off the scoreboard.

The Fighting Sioux (11-3) mustered a 12-play scoring drive to make it 31-19 on Adam Roland's 1-yard run with 43 seconds remaining, but Pitt State recovered the ensuing onside kick attempt and ran out the clock.

Pitt State, which has shattered NCAA all-division records for scoring (806 points) and total offense (8,605 yards) in its magical run this season, took some time to get itself untracked against a North Dakota defensive unit that entered the game leading Division II in point allowed (10.8 ppg).


UND got on the board first when Roland capped a short drive with a 12-yard run with 5:40 to play in the first quarter. Pitt State countered to knot the score with 4 seconds to play in the initial period when Philpot tossed an 8-yard TD pass to Jermaine Carpenter.

The Fighting Sioux rebounded to take a 10-7 lead of Jeff Glas' 30-yard field goal at the 9:17 mark of the second quarter, but Philpot and sophomore running back Germaine Race promptly led the Gorillas down the field, moving back in front, 14-10, on Race's 3-yard run with 6:38 remaining in the half.

Race finished the game with a game-high 19 carries for 158 yards for Pitt State, which compiled 304 total rushing yards in the game on 46 carries. The Fighting Sioux scored again on their opening possession of the second half, trimming PSU's lead to 14-13 on a 32-yard field goal by Glas.

Philpot put the Gorillas in front for good with 45 seconds left in the third period when he tossed a 19-yard TD pass to Carpenter, who had four catches for 46 yards in the game.

Nathan Alleman added a 28-yard field goal with 9:32 to play in the game to make it a 24-13 margin. Alleman originally misfired on a 32-yard field goal attempt on the drive, but UND was flagged for a personal foul, leaping, penalty on the kick to extend the Gorillas' offensive series.

GRAND FORKS, N.D.—Quarterback Reed Manke and running back Chris Beatty each ran for a touchdown, Jeff Glas added three field goals and UND held Minnesota Duluth to 282 yards in total offense in a 23-12 win over the Bulldogs in the first round of the NCAA playoffs. The Fighting Sioux now advance to the second round and will travel to top-ranked Grand Valley State next Saturday.

UND used a ball-control offense to amass 229 rushing yards and counter the prolific Minnesota Duluth passing attack. UND quarterback Ted Schlafke passed 64 times to tie an NCAA Division II postseason record, completing 34 of them, but was only able to find the end zone once, that being a 26-yard pass to Ross Schumacher early in the second quarter that turned a 10-0 UND lead into a 10-6 game.

The Sioux defense yielded just a pair of Britt Baumann field goals the rest of the way – a 35-yarder midway through the third quarter and a 20-yarder with 10:32 left in regulation.

UND's rushing attack was led by Beatty, who carried 31 times for 113 yards, and whose three-yard touchdown run on the first play of the second quarter staked the Sioux to a 10-0 lead.

The Schlafke-to-Schumacher touchdown connection capped a 13-play, 80-yard drive on the ensuing possession. But the Sioux were able to counter with an 11-play, 59-yard scoring drive of their own on the next series. A seven-yard run by receiver Weston Dressler gave UND the ball at the two-yard line and Manke finished off the drive on the next play with a two-yard TD plunge, giving the Sioux a 17-6 going into halftime.

UND's offense sputtered to start the second half with its first three drives ending with a punt and two fumbles, but the Sioux defense held, allowing just a Baumann field goal with 7:51 left in the quarter.


The Sioux added to their lead early in the fourth quarter, when Glas nailed a 37-yarder with 14:07 left on the clock to give UND a 20-9.

Glas and Baumann traded field goals in the game's final 10:32 and UND senior strong safety Danny Gagner sealed the win with his second interception of the game with 1:07 left on the clock.

Manke was an efficient 15-of-24 for 121 yards and was not intercepted. Chris Belmore started the game and went 2-for-4 for 12 yards.

Senior receiver Dan Grossman was the top target for UND, catching 10 passes for 73 yards. Dressler caught four passes for 45 yards and ran three times for 72 yards, including a 57-yard scamper on UND's first possession of the game.

The win improves UND's overall record to 10-2 and sets up a fourth postseason matchup with Grand Valley State in the past five seasons. The two teams split a pair of appearances in the NCAA title game, with UND winning in 2001 and GVSU coming out on top in 2003. The Sioux defeated the Lakers 19-15 in Grand Forks during last year's quarterfinal round.

ALLENDALE, Mich.—Quarterback Cullen Finnerty threw a pair of second-quarter touchdown passes to lead Grand Valley State to a 17-3 win over the Fighting Sioux in the second round of the NCAA playoffs this afternoon at Lubbers Stadium.

The loss ends UND's season at 10-3, while the Lakers now advance to next week's Northwest Region final against Saginaw Valley State.

Finnerty's two touchdown passes came four-and-a-half minutes apart and provided the difference in a struggle between two of the top defensive teams in Division II football. It wasn't until nearly five minutes had elapsed in the second quarter when the Lakers finally broke a scoreless deadlock on a broken play.

Finnerty escaped the grasp of UND linebacker Zachariah Babington-Johnson and found tight end Jeremy Cochrane wide open at the Sioux 10 and Cochrane took it to the end zone untouched, giving the Lakers a 7-0 lead 4:22 into the second quarter.

GVSU hit paydirt again on their next possession, as Finnerty connected with wide receiver Antione Trent for a 26-yard touchdown and a 14-0 lead with 6:08 remaining in the half.

The Sioux responded with their best drive of the half, marching to the GVSU 38. But running back Brandon Brady was hit at the 35 by linebacker Anthony Adams and the ball popped right into the arms of Laker defensive end Michael McFadden and GVSU took over at midfield. The turnover helped the Lakers preserve their 14-point lead heading into halftime.


The Lakers had an opportunity to add to the lead on their first possession of the second half, but Greene missed a 48-yard field goal attempt wide left. GRAND FORKS – Today's day was Ryan Chappell's. The freshman running back, playing in his first career NCAA Division II playoff game, ran for 235 yards and five touchdowns, averaging 14.7 yards per attempt. In the process he broke a number of UND records.

Today's game was also about the offensive line, who not only opened up a number of holes that got Chappell started, but controlled the tempo of UND's 42-0 victory over Winona State in the first round of the NCAA Division II playoffs. The Sioux ended with 404 rushing yards and 595 total yards, the best offensive production all season.

Chappell got the Sioux rolling on UND's first possession of the game. After a Mike Salerno punt backed the Sioux to the 21-yard line, Chappell had a big hole and ran for 56 yards on UND's first play. One play later Chappell rounded the left side of the offensive line and ran 23 yards for a touchdown.

Stopped by a Reed Manke interception and a Lee Groeschl fumble, UND stalled on the next two drives. But Chappell got things going for Sioux again early in the second quarter.

On a second-and-fourth from the Winona 24-yard line, Chappell rushed for 16 yards. Manke connected with Chappell for a one-yard reception on the next play, but a facemask penalty was called, giving the Sioux a first down from the three. Chappell scored his second touchdown on the next play, giving the Sioux a 14-0 lead with 13:18 remaining the second quarter.

The Sioux defense held Winona scoreless on its next possession, an 11-play, 45-yard effort, which led to Chappell's next touchdown. Chappell ran for 3, 16, 7 and 21 yards. The final effort went for the score.

Chappell's fourth touchdown was probably the prettiest. Chappell was surrounded at the line of scrimmage, but broke through and weaved his way through a number of defenders for the score. That touchdown gave the Sioux a 28-0 with 1:18 remaining in the second quarter.



OMAHA, Neb.—Freshman kicker Brandon Hellevang booted a 26-yard field goal with 2:45 remaining and the Sioux defense held Nebraska-Omaha to -8 yards on its final offensive possession as the Fighting Sioux defeated the Mavericks 38-35 this afternoon in NCAA second round action.

UND's defensive stand that set up Hellevang's game-winning kick came after UNO's offense scored touchdowns on five of its six full possessions through three quarters. The Mavericks were driving again midway through the fourth quarter until Sioux defensive back Rory Manke (So., Detroit Lakes, Minn.) intercepted a Zach Miller pass at the UND 32.

That put the ball in the hands of the elder Manke, Sioux senior quarterback Reed Manke, who coolly marched the Sioux 42 yards, chipping five and a half minutes off the clock, to put Hellevang in position. The Sioux defense held on UNO's final possession, giving UND its only two defensive stops when it mattered most.

Those defensive stands were a stark contrast from the first three quarters of the game, when the two offenses punched and counter-punched throughout. Even the first play of the game was symbolic of the offensive fireworks that were to come.

UND won the coin toss and elected to receive, and junior Weston Dressler (Bismarck, N.D.) dashed his way 66 yards into Maverick territory. UND capped off the opening drive with a Manke-to-Blair Grover (So., Mequon, Wis.) two-yard touchdown.

But as the would throughout the day, Nebraska-Omaha came right back with an answer to UND's points. Miller scored his first of four rushing touchdowns on the day, running off tackle right for a one-yard touchdown on the very next series. UND's Will Kusler (Sr., Kulm, N.D.) blocked the extra point attempt and the Sioux held a 7-6 lead.

On UND's second offensive series, Manke engineered a seven-play, 54-yard drive that ended with a six-yard rushing touchdown by Dressler, the first of his career along the ground.

Trailing 14-6, Miller and the Maverick offense went to work and the junior QB made it 14-13 game with a dazzling 14-yard scoring scamper on a broken play. The Mavericks grabbed their first - and only - lead of the game early in the second quarter, when UNO running back Nate Wurth busted a tackle and raced up the sideline for a 54-yard scoring run to make it 20-14 Mavs.

This time the Sioux were forced to answer and they did. UND moved the ball 80 yards on nine plays, the last 39 of which were covered by a Manke-to-Brady Trenbeath (Jr., Cavalier, N.D.) pass and run over the middle and UND regained the lead at 21-20.

UNO looked poised to take the lead late in the first half, but Andrew McCawley's 39-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Steve Brennan (Sr., West Fargo, N.D.). Ten plays and 78 yards later, it was Manke to Dressler for a 19-yard scoring strike with 50.3 seconds left in the half and UND took a 28-20 lead into the locker room.

Miller scored on a two-yard plunge on UNO's first series of the second half, but UND countered with a one-yard run by Brandon Brady (So., Bloomington,

ALLENDALE, Mich.—For the second straight season, North Dakota's bid for an NCAA Division II football championship has ended with a loss at Grand Valley State. The top-ranked Lakers used 27 first-quarter points to upend the eighth-ranked Sioux 30-20 this afternoon at Lubbers Stadium in the NCAA quarterfinal. Grand Valley's first-quarter explosion proved to be too big a hole for the Sioux to climb out of, although UND made a spirited push by scoring 20 of the game's final 23 points.

When GVSU senior quarterback and Harlon Hill Trophy finalist Cullen Finnerty hit Terry Mitchell in the end zone from 20 yards on the Lakers' third offensive play, it kick-started a scoring run that had the Sioux trailing 27-0 late in the first quarter.

On the Lakers' second possession, Finnerty found receiver Eric Fowler in the back corner of the end zone and GVSU led 14-0 midway through the opening quarter.

The Lakers struck again, this time on UND's next possession, when linebacker Anthony Adams stripped Sioux quarterback Reed Manke of the ball, and picked up and scampered untouched for a 28-yard touchdown.

Then less than four minutes later Finnerty again connected with Fowler, who made a spectacular, one-handed diving catch in the end zone for a four-yard score. The extra point missed, but the Lakers owned a commanding 27-0 lead with 1:40 remaining in the quarter.

UND's offense did begin to click in the second quarter, and the Sioux finally got on the board five minutes in when Manke hit freshman receiver Brady Trenbeath over the middle, and Trenbeath broke several tackles on his way to a 46-yard touchdown.


The Sioux appeared to be on the verge of making it a two-score game late in the first half, driving deep into Laker territory. But freshman running back Ryan Chappell coughed up the ball at the GVSU five-yard line, allowing the Lakers to hold on to their 27-7 lead going into the locker room.

UND did eventually make it a 27-14 game when Brandon Brady hit paydirt on a one-yard scoring plunge with seven seconds left in the third quarter. Grand Valley kicker Todd Carter connected on a 28-yard field goal four minutes into the fourth quarter, making it 30-14 with 11:18 remaining.

The Sioux would not go quietly, however. With just over five minutes remaining, Manke hit Weston Dressler on a swing pass, and Dressler weaved his way into the end zone from 17-yards out for his school-record 25th-career touchdown reception. UND lined up to go for the two-point conversion, but Manke slipped dropping back to pass and the Sioux deficit stood at 10.

The UND defense forced a pair of turnovers in the dying minutes, but the Sioux were able to turn either of them into points.

NOTES Dressler had 10 catches for 122 yards and surpassed Dan Grossman as the team's all-time leader in career receptions (167). Dressler also finished the season with a school-record 1,215 receiving yards to break Ron Gustafson's 33-yard

FIRST ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

GRAND FORKS, N.D.—For the fifth consecutive season – and sixth time in seven years – the Fighting Sioux football team has a postseason date with two-time defending national champion Grand Valley State.

UND got rushing touchdowns from four different players while the Sioux defense held Winona State's high-powered offense off of the scoreboard in a 44-2 win over the Warriors this afternoon in the first round of the NCAA postseason.

The third-seeded Sioux will now travel to Allendale, Mich., to face No. 2 seed and top-ranked Grand Valley State next Saturday, marking the third straight year UND will face the Lakers at Lubbers Stadium. The year's Sioux squad advanced to the second round with a potent ground game and a stingy defense. UND racked up 298 yards rushing, while limiting the Warriors to 28 yards on the ground and just 236 yards of total offense.

Sioux sophomore running back Ryan Chappell (Grand Forks), who ran for a UND playoff record 265 yards and five touchdowns against WSU a year ago in the playoffs, followed a similar script today. Chappell carried 19 times for 176 yards and two touchdowns, with both touchdowns coming in the first half when he rattled off 143 yards on 14 carries.

Chappell's first score – an eight yard scamper on UND's opening possession – capped off an efficient 65-yard drive in which all five Sioux plays resulted in a first down.


UND appeared to have stretched the lead to 14-0 on their next possession, but penalties resulted in the Sioux having a touchdown called back twice in the span of three plays. First, Chappell had a 25-yard scoring run nullified by an illegal shift penalty on the Sioux, then freshman Josh Murray (Pepin, Wis.) had a 20-yard touchdown run wiped out by a holding call. The Sioux eventually settled for a 41-yard Brandon Hellevang (So., Fargo, N.D.) field goal to lead 1-0 after the first quarter.

Hellevang added a 19-yard boot four minutes into the second quarter, then Chappell found the end zone for the second time on UND's next possession, rattling off a 17-yard touchdown to make it 20-0 Sioux with 6:46 remaining.

The Warriors finally got on the scoreboard late in the half, albeit in a rather unconventional manner. Facing 3rd-and-long from his own 1-yard line, Sioux quarterback Danny Freund (Kenosha, Wis.) inadvertently threw a pass at one of his offensive linemen while escaping pressure, resulting in an intentional grounding penalty and a safety for the Warriors. Those would be the only points on the day for the Warriors, who came into the game averaging 480 yards of total offense per game.

Senior receiver Weston Dressler (Bismarck, N.D.), Freund and freshman Steven Battle (Amesbury, Mass.) each found the end zone along the ground in the second half, and Hellevang added his third field goal from 24 yards. After Chappell's standout first half, it was the freshman Battle who took a bow in the game's final 30 minutes, finishing the day with 80 yards on 19 carries, including the first touchdown of his career.

NOTES: UND is now 10-0 all-time in playoff games at the Alerus Center ... The victory was the 90th at UND for head coach Dale Lennon, tying him with

SECOND ROUND, NCAA DII PLAYOFFS

ALLENDALE, Mich.—The Fighting Sioux have played their final NCAA Division II football game.

UND's storied run at the Division II level, one that spanned more than a century of football, came to an end this afternoon with a 21-14 NCAA second round playoff loss at top-ranked and two-time defending national champion Grand Valley State.

The win was the 39th row for the Lakers, who have won four of the last five Division II titles. It did not come without a fight from the seventh-ranked Sioux, who were hit hard by injuries to key players, both prior to and during the game.

The Lakers built a 14-0 halftime lead while limiting UND's high powered offense to just 83 yards and five first downs in the first half. Then, in the third quarter, UND senior punter Brent Halfmann (Stephen, Minn.) was unable to corral a low snap and had his punt attempt blocked, giving the Lakers the ball at the Sioux 22-yard line. One player later, GVSU quarterback Brad Ickie lobbed a pass over the middle to Jonn Mathews and the junior tight end made a diving catch just inside the Sioux goal line to push the lead to 20-0.

GVSU kicker Todd Carter missed the extra point attempt, but a personal foul call against the Sioux gave Carter another chance, and he made good on the second try to make it a 21-0 Laker lead. But then the Sioux began to rally against long odds for the second straight year at Lubbers Stadium.

After a poor Grand Valley punt gave UND the ball at the Laker 39-yard line, the Sioux began benefitting from some breaks. On the first play of the drive, freshman quarterback Jake Landry (Grand Forks), playing in relief of injured starter Danny Freund (Jr., Kenosha, Wis.), fired a rocket over the middle that bounced off of the hands of Laker free safety Jacob McGuckin at his own 15-yard line. The ball ricocheted in the air behind McGuckin, were UND senior receiver Weston Dressler (Bismarck, N.D.) calmly hauled it in at the 10 and raced the rest of the way to the end zone.

Sophomore kicker Brandon Hellevang (Fargo, N.D.) had his extra point attempt blocked – his first miss in 106 attempts – but the Sioux were on the board at 21-6 with 7:27 left in the third quarter.


With Grand Valley State going for it on 4th-and-1 from the Sioux 41, sophomore linebacker Bobby Stroup (Fargo, N.D.) burst through the line and stopped Lakers' running back Blake Smolen for a loss of two, turning the ball over to the Sioux offense at their own 43 late in the quarter.

Four players later freshman running back Josh Murray (Pepin, Wis.) found the end zone from three yards out, and then added a two-point conversion to cut the deficit to 21-14 with 1:08 left in the third quarter.

But that same 21-14 count would still be on the stadium clock 15 minutes later, despite a handful of opportunities for the Sioux to tie the game. UND's best chance to pull even came after a James Berezik fumble inside Laker territory that was recovered by Stroup. But the Sioux, hindered by a holding penalty, were unable to move the ball and were forced to punt.

The Lakers then strung together a 14-play, seven-minute drive that ran off all but the game's final two minutes. GVSU converted on two key third downs and a fourth down to keep the drive alive, then gambled on a 4th-and-3 on UND's 15 that was thwarted by a Donovan Alexander (Sr., Winnipeg, Manitoba) pass breakup.

UND's final comeback hopes were extinguished, though, when Landry was sacked by Laker All-American Anthony Adams on 4th-and-1 from the Sioux 22.

Landry finished the game 8-for-12 for 110 yards and the touchdown to Dressler, who finished with five catches for 94 yards. Freund completed 9-of-17 passes for 66 yards before leaving the game.

NOTES: Dressler, a Harlon Hill Trophy finalist, finished as UND's all-time leader in virtually every receiving category possible. His 243 career receptions rank 15th in Division II history and his 38 career touchdown catches are tied for 17th all-time. Dressler also finished the 2007 season with 1,272 receiving yards, breaking the UND single-season record he initially set in 2006 ...
